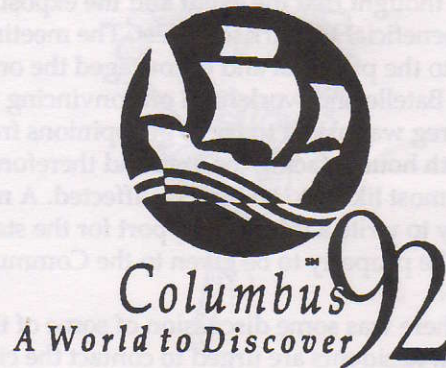
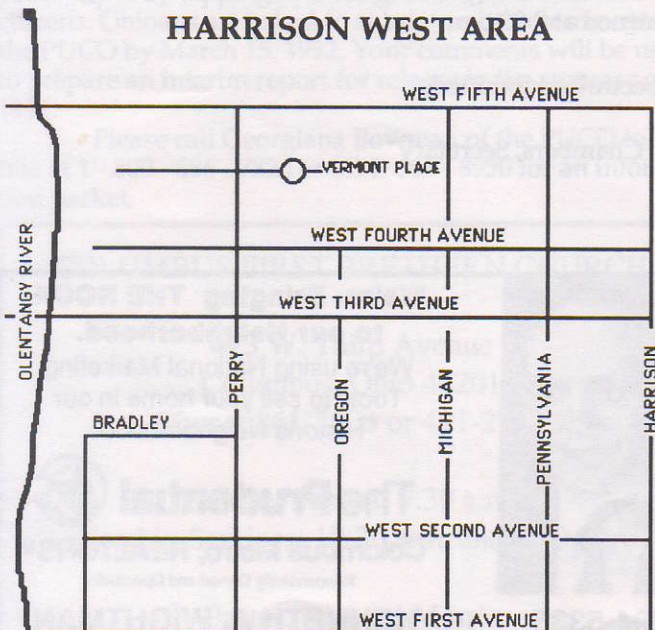

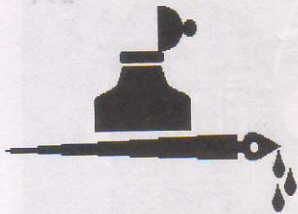

Minutes of the Harrison West Society, December 12, 1991 Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. with Glenn Cook, president, presiding. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as

published in the last Harrison West News.

John Cowin, treasurer, reported that the Society had a balance of \$591.01. Motions to pay bills of \$88.50 to Insty - Prints for printing of the News and \$14.72 for postage were passed.

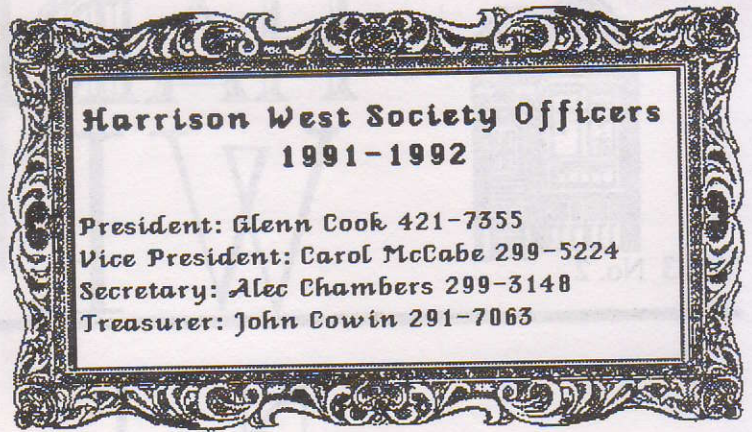
A committee to nominate candidates for officers for the March elections of the Society was appointed. Candy Gill is to chair the committee with Pastor Richard Morris and Chris Hershberger as the other members.

Greg Maynard was present on behalf of the Community Fest. The event has grown to a size that can no longer be accommodated by the present site it has used in the Short North since 1983. The site is also to be developed by the owners this year.

The Community Fest has drawn up a list of possible sites for the event (25 - 27 July) and one of these is the vacant area belonging to Batelle on the corner of Third and Perry. The emphasis of the event is on social issues and issues of peace. The event has been trouble free since its early days about 20 years ago and the organization provides its own security, has good relations with the police and would bring its own liability insurance with it. Some disruption would be expected as a result of bringing several thousand people through the area on that weekend but it was thought that the event and the exposure it brings could be beneficial to Harrison West. The meeting was receptive to the proposal and encouraged the organization to contact Batelle and work hard on convincing them of its virtues. Greg was asked to try to get opinions from those people with houses facing the area and therefore who would be most likely to be directly affected. A motion for the Society to write a letter of support for the staging of the event on the property to be given to the Community Fest was passed.

There was some discussion of some of the eyesores in the area. Residents are urged to contact the city office responsible for dealing with them at 645 - 8191.

Dale Pifer a volunteer working with Ameriflora came to the meeting to show a publicity tape about the

event and to answer questions. Ameriflora is one of a group of special events including Expo '92 in Seville (Spain) and the Man and the Sea exhibition in Genoa: the birthplace of Columbus, to celebrate his voyages. The event is expected to bring about four million visitors to central Ohio between April 20 and October 12. The event alone will create 6000 full time jobs. There will be exhibits from at least fifteen countries in an area larger than Disneyland. The city is already seeing advantages in terms of permanent improvements to Franklin Park and the building of a special facility at the Chadwick Arboretum for the handling of incoming plants. Dale answered a number of questions dealing with all aspects of the event. He was particularly enthusiastic about the exhibit being put on by the Smithsonian (choosing one from many) as well as the entertainment and dining.

It was announced that the Planning and Development Committee is moving from the first Thursday of the month to the third (the week after the Society meeting). The venue is unchanged.

It was announced that a speaker from Batelle will be at the February meeting to discuss any plans they may have for the area.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

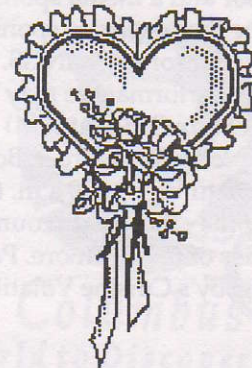

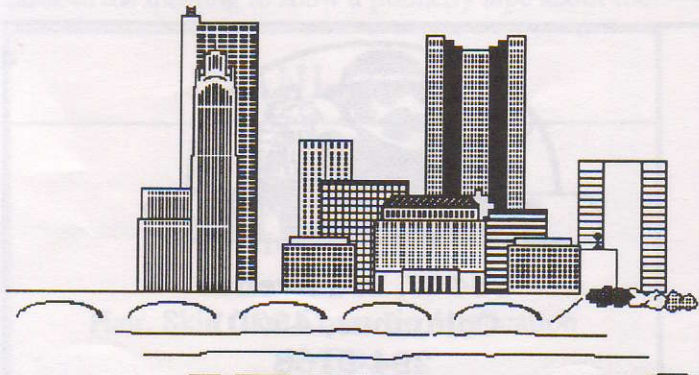
Through lights, sound, sets and costumes the audience enters Emily's mind to see what she sees, hear what she hears and feel what she feels.
