#### Battelle to Celebrate 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

Battelle, our neighbor, will be celebrating its 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in October.

The world renowned research and development organization opened in 1929 with 30 people at King Avenue. It was founded by Gordon Battelle, whose family were early leaders in the American steel industry. Today, Battelle, with the national laboratories that it manages or co-manages, oversees 16,000 staff members and conducts \$3 billion in annual research and development in more than 30 countries.

Battelle accomplishments include the development of the Xerox machine, pioneering work on optical digital recording technology that led to the compact disc, numerous medical advancements, fiber otpics technology for telecommunications, cut-resistant golf balls, and the universal product code for checkout at super markets.

Battelle's work today focuses on health and life sciences, energy and environment, homeland defense, transportation and space, education, and community service.

The nonprofit organization gives 20 percent of its net income each year back to the communities it serves. It employs 2,500 people in Greater Columbus.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 PM with a quorum of voting members present (25); President Dave Butler presiding. **Routine Business** 

*Minutes* Veda Gilp motioned to approve the minutes of the last meeting; Passed.

*Treasurer's Report* Treasurer Tom Maxwell reported a balance of \$5,855, with current bills paid. **Old Business and Committee** 

#### **Reports:** *Humko/TIF Update* Dave Butler reported on the progress of the

reported on the progress of the negotiations with Victorian Village about the shared TIF. Rob Harris reported on the TIF document - a 50-50 split after money for Harrison Park is taken, resulting in \$2.8 million to the Park immediately with \$1.4 million going to Harrison West and Victorian Village. Jerry Colvin motioned to remove "horsetrading" and "budgeting" terminology from the TIF agreement: Passed. Rick Kobee motioned to approve the shared TIF agreement as amended; Passed. Harris reported that Outlands on Perry has been purchased and is scheduled for demolition after October 1.

Harris also reported that Columbus Traffic and Sanitation removed two alleys west of Perry Street in the Harrison Park development. Construction of the models should begin by October 1.

*5th and Perry Battelle Park* Craig Copeland reported on the park plans. Battelle is ready to begin planting in the Park and paving the bench circle. Summer Party Wrap Up Dave Butler reported on the success of the Summer Party in the Park. General discussion, and a consensus that next year we would not need the Police on Horses or the clown, as there are too few children attending to warrant such expenses. *Crime Report* Neighborhood Police Liaison Steve Smith reported that crime is about as usual -"not too bad."

2004 Yard Sale After general discussion, Debby Colvin moved that Harrison West move the yard sale to the same day as the Victorian Village Spring Yard Sale and not have a Harrison West Yard Sale this fall; Passed.

At the first annual Fall *ArtFair*, local and regional artists will converge for a one-day happening of art, music, poetry, dance, and theater.



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
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#### Harrison Park Plat Gets Nod from Council

The preliminary subdivision plat for Harrison Park (04630-00000-00019) was approved by the City of Columbus on August 20, and signed by Christopher Presutti, Chief Zoning Official. This means all of the new streets, alleys, extensions of West First Avenue, extension of Perry Street, modification of Perry for the traffic island, and the parkland dedication is officially transferred over to the City as public land.

The site has also been properly cleaned up in regards to vacating Percy Street and any alleys that were lost over the past 150 years. Permit submission will happen in the following week for the 10 new homes on the East side of Perry Street. Proposed ground breaking will be in October.



#### Vote for Issues 4-11

The City of Columbus has placed eight capital improvement bond issues on the November 2, ballot (Issue 4-11).

Passage of the bond issues, which will drive more than \$600 million in new investment for neighborhood projects, *will not result in any new taxes*.

Mayor Michael Coleman, City Council President Matt Habash and City Auditor Hugh Dorrian are all partnering to ensure passage of these very important issues

Despite difficult economic times, Columbus remains the only large city in the United States that maintains a AAA bond rating

By placing the issues on the ballot, the City is asking for voter approval to issue bonds.

• This is done because the City receives a lower interest rate on the bonds with voter approval

• As a result, tax dollars are saved and a larger number of projects are financed

• The bonds are retired by income tax dollars and Utility revenues

If Issues 4-11 do not receive voter approval, the City will still issue the debt, resulting in fewer projects for neighborhoods because of an increased interest rate on the borrowed money

City leaders met with residents at a series of six public meetings to solicit input on how to spend our capital dollars

As a result, the Mayor and City Council created the bond package with the proposed projects for the next five years.

Issue 4—Safety and Health (\$40.7 million)

Issue 5—Refuse (\$21.1 million)

Issue 6—Electricity (\$12.2 million)

Issue 7—Streets and Highways (\$184.4 million)

Issue 8—Sanitary Sewer (\$95.8 million)

Issue 9—Water (\$100 million)

Issue 10—Storm Sewers (\$104 million)

Issue 11—Recreation and Parks (\$46.6 million)





#### Affordable Housing Renovations Finally Scheduled

The schedule for the renovation to the affordable housing in Harrison West has been set. Renovations of the Fourth Avenue School building (1200 Michigan) have already begun and are scheduled to continue through October; we look forward to having our Seniors back after their yearlong relocation.

The units on 1170-1180, 1160-1166, 1146-1156 Michigan Avenue and 428-434 W. 3rd Avenue are scheduled to be renovated from October to December. The units on 449-459, 450-460, 433-439 Helen Court and 433-439 W. 4th Avenue are scheduled to be renovated from November to February. This schedule is subject to change.

#### Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Turkish Cuisine

*(Continued from Page 8)* The stuffed grape leaves are very good, very tender, and touched with cinnamon.

In fact, everything is touched (or dusted or coated) with cinnamon. That's not necessarily a negative; just a fact.

From the appetizers we moved to the traditional Turkish dishes. I found the stuffed cabbage that Jean ordered at \$9.75(!) was the best thing on the table. Absolutely wonderful, and so many rolls that even though Jean gave me one, she still had three to take home. They are served with a very savory tomato sauce and tart yogurt.

Deb had the stuffed eggplant with beef and spices, including cinnamon, and a different fresh tomato sauce. Oh, yum! Again, more than enough to fill up both you and a take-home box.

Kebobs are traditional, so that's what I ordered. All kebobs are halal meat, and are marinated, cooked on an open flame, and served with rice and grilled vegetables. I ordered the Adana Kebob, which is ground gyro meat mixed with red bell peppers and grilled on flat skewers. Very good – a sophisticated gyro. Dessert, like everything else at Turkish Cuisine, is made on the spot by the owner-chef. The baklava was very tender with lots of honey and possibly was the best I ever had. The rice pudding is finished under a flame like creme brulee. It's delicious but very solid, not as sweet as expected, with a subtle cinnamon flavor. Next time I'm getting the milk custard wrapped in phylo. It looked irresistible.

Until they get their license, you are welcome to take your own wine; there's a \$4 corkage fee.

#### Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Turkish Cuisine

Here's a new restaurant you should try. It's north of OSU at 2653 N. High Street in a shabby block of depressed-looking buildings. Go around back, however, and you discover that there's lots of free parking and everything's been spruced up to clean and inviting.

Friends Debra Stollenwerk, who is an Executive Editor at Pearson Education/Prentice Hall Publishing/Merrill Education and Dr. Jean Godby, who is something increidble estoeric and frighteningly technical at OCLC, found this place and insisted that Eadie Gourmet would like it. They were so right.

Begin with the bread. The Turkish answer to pita, it's a fat flat bread that's very yeasty and chewy. It's served with reall butter, but you can skip that in favor of scooping up an extra good humus and tabuli.

Because Eadie Gourmet needs to sample lots, we ordered the small appetiser plate, which consists of your choice of five cold appetisers. You can balance the subtle such as the spinache saute with the lebni with its truckload of garlic. The spinach was sauted with onions and herbs with a touch of red peppers which added sweetness. Hard to describe but very, very tasty. The lebni was wonderful – yogurt mixed with nuts and scallions and that truck of garlic. *(Continued on Page 7)*  Harrison West News P.O.
