Harrison Park News Is Good

"We're ready to go when it dries out," Mark Wagenbrenner, the developer of the AC Humko site, told the *News* recently.

Depending on the weather, house construction on the site, now known as Harrison Park for marketing purposes, will begin in March. Average frozen winter weather is something they can handle, but the excess rain and mud have kept workers out of the site for weeks now.

On a very positive note, the environmental contamination they thought they would encounter has been negligible and has all been dealt with. There is no gas left in the soil.

The largest problem has been vegetable-oil contaminated dirt in a 250 X 200 square foot area. Contractors are removing this soil to a depth of 24 feet and taking it to a landfill. "It's not hazardous material," Mark states, "you just can't build on it."

The caboose has been sold, and will be removed as soon as AEP has time to drop some lines.

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

The City of Columbus had determined that Wagenbrenner would pay to dig up and replace a broken 36-inch sewer line on the property. Inspection revealed that the line was in better condition than realized, and relining is all that's needed. That process is ongoing.

Questioned about the longtime sewer smell at the site, Mark replied, "We can't eliminate the sewer line because there's a lift station there handling flow from Grandview. But when we're finished, residents won't know it's there. It won't smell.

"Once the contaminated dirt is removed, we'll begin building the new sewers to serve the project and seven or eight houses on the east side of Perry Street," Wagenbrenner finished.


It's time to join or renew your membership in the City's most highly respected neighborhood group – the Harrison West Society.

Before all the rain, snow, and ice, the sidewalks were repaired and fences rebuilt and repainted.


Inside, each unit is being given a new kitchen, new cabinetry, new floor coverings, new bathroom and fixtures, new wall coverings.

Go Look at the Cliff Dwellers Mural on High Street

The Cliff Dwellers mural on High Street on the side of the Burgundy Room and United Commercial Travelers building is garnering some wonderful comments. Cliff Dwellers, a copy of the George Bellows painting of a New York tenement, was painted by Curtis Goldstein and Michelle Attias, local mural artists.

Next time you're stressing about painting the living room, consider that the mural was 45' high x 60' wide (that's 2,700 square feet), required 40 gallons of paint (every drop donated by Creative Paints), two artists painting eight or nine hours a day every day for one month, and a lift truck (donated by United Rentals, thank you very much).

The project was funded mainly by the Greater Columbus Arts Council to the tune of \$7,500 and the Ohio Arts Council for \$1,585. Private donors contributed the remaining \$9,000. Funding was arranged through the BrickStreet Arts Association (BSAA). BrickStreets is a not-for-profit group that facilitates public art in Columbus through assistance with the process of producing public art. That includes assistance with fund-raising, Calls for Artists, seating juries for juried selection of artists, contract negotiation, and public interface with the process and the artists.

I had the sausage and bean soup, which is a country dish that Abbracci has refined into something so delicate that every delicious flavor shines.

For our main course, we ordered an 8 oz. filet mignon, a 24 oz. ribeye, Tournedos Abbracci, and New York Strip Au Poivre. When I tell you that the steaks undergo a 32-day dry aging process, that they come from Michael's Meats, and then are cooked by a master, you will understand why we were happy, happy, happy with our selections.

Unless you share, you probably will take steak home. I got two lunches from my steak go-box. Such good meat is not cheap. My ribeye, one of their most flavorful steaks, was \$30.

Steaks are accompanied by garlic mashed potatoes (very good), gorgonzola scalloped potatoes (unfortunately served lukewarm, but would be great hot), grilled vegetables, or red sauce linguine.

If you like risotto, order the parmesan spinach risotto. It's \$4 as a side and worth every cent. I promise.

Maddy ordered as a side the sauteed garlic spinach. This is a dish that elevates spinach to gourmet status. It was one perfect step past wilted and studded with tasty garlic pieces. Unfortunately, her first serving was cold.

Of course, Abbracci offers all kinds of pasta, veal, fish, and a walnut encrusted porkloin that looked incredible.

Osso Bucco, calamari, and escargot always are available, too.

People who dine with Eadie Gourmet learn that they must have dessert, so they force themselves to take up the dessert menu. This one is easy to take up, since it's full of delightful treats.

Of course, after a meal such as we had just finished, none of us were up to a full dessert, so we shared.

In the interest of exploring chocolate offerings for my readers,

I ordered the chocolate almond silk terrine. Oh my. Pretty. Silky. Intensely chocolate. Poached cherries in a luscious sauce decorating the plate. Addictive. Order it if you love chocolate.

Just to be different, we also ordered the caramelized nut tort made with pistacios, walnuts, almonds and napped with a citrus Grand Marnier anglaise. That's orange cream sauce, I think. Sure was good. The tort was not too sweet, but rich, rich, rich.

Perhaps lighter desserts would have been in order, but after all that red meat, we just weren't thinking of our arteries.

By the way, the dining room is beautiful. Elegant. Spacious. And quiet. Finally, a restaurant where you needn't shout to be heard by your dinner companions. There's \$5 valet parking. Reservations are necessary at 224-2373. Look for Abbracci at 511 North High at Swan, underneath the Hampton Inn.

Go treat yourself.

During the Big Freeze, Pat Lewis, the doyenne of Victorian Village, Lynda Mahaffey, who needs no introduction, and Maddy Weisz of BrickStreet Arts fame, and I sledded over to Abbracci for a red-meat repast.

Abbracci is the new restaurant run by Ryan Stopper of the R.J. Snappers family. It's located between the Greek church and the Hampton Inn on High Street.

The first thing any restaurant wants you to do is order drinks. I found the wine list to be complete, not overwhelming, and just a bit pricy. However, it's full of big, mouth-filling red wines, perfect accompaniments to the fine aged beef dishes which are the stars of the menu.

The restaurant is beautiful, and I wanted to eat everything in sight — it all looked so tasty. Given that the kitchen staff really can cook, imagine these treats on your tongue: wild mushroom pasta with walnut cream sauce, clams casino with bacon and roasted garlic bread crumbs, beef carpaccio (yes, it's raw), asparagus and wild mushroom bruschetta.

Lynda and Pat began with the chopped salad, which is very large, uses romaine and ripe tomatoes among other ingredients, and boasts an excellent blue cheese dressing.

Next time, I'm ordering the Caesar salad, which Pat promises is outstanding.
