A two-year long campaign has paid off for residents of Harrison West.

The Membership Committee, chaired by Tony Celebrezze, produced a concentrated campaign of letters and postcards to everyone living and working in Harrison West. The result is 174 duespaying members.

Membership in the Society empowers Harrison Westers to guide the direction the Harrison West Society takes the neighborhood. They will be able to vote on the exciting events happening in the neighborhood, including: •how to spend the TIF income •where to buy parkland with the \$1 million the City and Rec and Parks paid for relinquishing our interest in Gowdy Field •Conservation District rules •how to spend UIRF funds •changing the constitution and bylaws

Obviously, membership in the Society has its rewards.

TIF is BIG Win-Win for Harrison West

Paying your property taxes won't get any easier, but you can be sure that any increases in your taxes for the next 30 years will stay right here in Harrison West to improve the neighborhood. That's the long and short of the Neighborhood Tax Increment Financing (TIF) which was put into place in February, 2004, on a basis of 770 properties. The first proceeds will be coming to the neighborhood in December, 2006.

You know your property taxes will increase over the next 30 years, partly because property taxes always do, but mostly because the property owners in Harrison West have worked so hard to make this a very valuable neighborhood.

Consider that just thirty years ago, Harrison West was in such decline, the City allowed Battelle to bulldoze whole streets of houses. We lost half of Vermont Place, several blocks of Fourth Avenue, and everything from Fifth south to Third from Perry to the river.

Consider the TIF our reward for working so hard to save our neighborhood.

The TIF doesn't raise your property taxes. In fact, the TIF doesn't affect your property taxes at all. What it does is bring any increase in your property taxes back to be spent in Harrison West rather than somewhere else in Franklin County.

And, yes, the Columbus Public Schools get their percentage from the increase before Harrison West gets ours. Got to keep the schools solvent.

The first TIF monies will be used to buy land for and to develop Harrison Park. After that, all the *increased* tax revenue generated because Harrison West is prospering will come back to Harrison West.

For neighborhood property owners, there is no downside to the TIF. None. Zero. It's totally a Win-Win for them and the neighborhood.

The meeting was called to order at 7 PM with a quorum of voting members present (28); President Mary Funk presiding. **Routine Business**

Minutes Amendments to the minutes: Jerry Colvin motioned that a letter be sent to the New Victorians about the condos on Perry; Pastor Richard Morris motioned to approve the minutes of the last meeting as amended; Passed.

Treasurer's Report Treasurer Tom Maxwell reported a balance of \$6,064, with current bills paid.

Old Business and Committee Reports: *President's Report* President Mary Funk reported on the UIRF application.

Audit Report Chair Chris Ruder had no report.

Civic Relations Chair Pastor Richard Morris reported that the Council of Historic Neighborhoods will be discussing the proposed Conservation District guidelines.

Communications Committee Chair Stephanie Tresso reported that the brochure copy is almost completed. No actions have been taken to acknowledge or celebrate the 30th Anniversary of the Society.

Community Housing VP Harris reported that no more bingo prizes are needed for the Seniors. *Conservation Committee* Chair Seth Rothy reported that the City is almost ready to distribute a revised version of Conservation District guidelines.

Elections Committee Chair Rick Kobee reported that Steven Cross has accepted the position as the representative from Harrison West to the Short North Neighborhood Foundation. Jim Sloan motioned to officially send Steven Cross to SNNF; Passed. Tim Bledsoe motioned to send a letter about Cross and his selection to SNNF; Passed. Kobee reported that the Harrison West Executive Committee (HWEC) has elected to support Rob Harris for President, Mary Funk for Vice President, Barbara Kobee for Secretary, and Becky Borlaza for Treasurer. Barb Kobee requested that the May Harrison West News publish a call for candidates for Society officers and that officer candidates should submit their intent to the Elections Committee and the News. Bob Mangia pointed out that HWEC support of a slate could send the message that no one else need even try to run for an elected position. Veda Gilp observed that if Mary Funk is elected this year, it will be her seventh term as either President or Vice President of the Society, and that it would strengthen the Society if others

began to fill those positions.

Membership Report Chair Tony Celebrezze presented a list of 174 members, reporting that new members sign up or old members renew every time he sends a membership letter. Wants to mail more letters.

Parks Committee Co-Chair Bob Mangia reported that the Garden Tour will be June 11, and will be combined with the City-wide Open Garden Tour, and that Co-Chair Debby Colvin needs all sign up for inclusion right now. He reported that while there is no electricity in the Side by Side park yet, it is coming soon. He reports that the City has not scheduled to put water in the Harrison West Park this year, as Mollie O'Donnell promised. Martha Walker Garden Club will provide plants and mulch for purchase for Harrison West again this year. Craig Copeland wants approximately \$500 spent on Vermont Place. Mangia believes there is no reason to put plants into Harrison West Park since there is no water there.

Planning and Development Chair Jacob Sukosd was not present.

Social Tim Bledsoe had no report. Traffic Chair Craig Copeland reported that the 3rd Avenue traffic island will begin construction in the fall. President Mary Funk reported that Melinda Swan is to provide design and facilities for the tech corridor. *Crime Report* Community Liaison Officer Steve Smith was not present.

New Business and Announcements May Stuessy was present to discuss SNNF Pocket Parks.

A team was present to discuss the St. Joseph Montessori School at Hamlet and First. Friends of Goodale Park clean up will be April 22, and planting will be May 5.

Executive Committee will meet Monday, April 24, 2006, 6 PM.

The Harrison West Society will meet May 17, 2006 at 7 PM.

Adjourned at 8:00 PM.

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
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Village Gate Animal Hospital & Pet **Resort Opens in** Grandview

Side by Side Park on Third Avenue at the bridge; new perennial beds planted last fall. The park features the "Side by Side" sculpture by Charlotte Lees.

331 West Fourth Avenue Mark Holtzapple and Tim Prince; front plantings of mixed annuals, sun/shade plants including foxglove; also container plantings. At the rear is a shade garden featuring many mature hostas.

344 West Fourth Avenue Mark Hamsher; Back yard patio with shade garden including both annuals and perennials.

350 West Fourth Avenue Jim Slone and Jeff Stevens; low maintenance, tiered garden in front with holly, Japanese lilac, tulips and boxwood.


Japanese-inspired back yard highlighted by a Japanese maple and weeping pine in a raised bed of astilbe and other shade-loving plants.

358 West Fourth Avenue Rob Harris and Tim Bledsoe; compact, urban garden - mostly perennials - with decorative fountain.

480 West Fourth Avenue Doug Swartz and Scott Robinson; formal garden with container plantings in front. Back yard includes koi pond, and newly installed patio.

492 West Fourth Avenue Jerry and Debby Colvin; several varieties of ornamental trees, including a tricolor beech. Large variety of miniature to large hostas. Large back deck and arbor. Assorted perennials, including many labeled daylily varieties.

(Continued from Page 8) We ate lots of the excellent bread -- rosemary focaccia and salt rye. Our server brought more without unseemly begging on our part.

Maddy's thick-cut pork chop with mashed potatoes was a disappointment. The chop lacked both flavor and juices. To add insult, her mashed potatoes were barely room temperature.

I had the herb crusted walleye with rice pilaf. Though John snickered politely at my plebeian fish, it was fresh and perfectly cooked. The herb crust kept the fish moist and tender.

Under it was a lovely buttery lemony beurre blanc sauce.

The rice pilaf would have been tasty, had it been warm. It was colder than Maddy's potatoes.

Our waitperson brought new servings of both starches, hot this time. And good. Good enough that John and Maddy finished her mashed potatoes and I forked up quite a bit of my pilaf, especially after I pushed it into the beurre blanc sauce. Yum!

I was impressed with the wine list. The prices for the fine selection are reasonable, with quite a few different wines by the glass.

Since Eadie Gourmet always eats dessert, Maddy and I shared the hot bourbon peach cobbler. Though we found no hint of bourbon and very little crust, the cobbler was good.

Thom's, 1470 Grandview Avenue, 487-5719, reservations accepted. Lunch and dinner. All around, not a bad place to eat, especially if you're feeling oldish and need a reminder that you're not really.

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Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Thom's

Maddy Weisz, John Cowin and I dined at Thom's on Grandview last week to see what the talk is all about. The food was pretty good and the prices were about the same as the Columbus Fish Market. We were shocked to discover that, with the exception of the servers, we were the youngest people there! (If you know us, you know we're not exactly spring chickens -- free ranging or not.)

It seems that between 5 and 7:30. the Clarmont crowd descends on Thom's like lobbyists on the opening session of Congress.

John pronounced it "very un-Short Northy; as if someone had announced an early bird special."

Maddy had the house salad with mesclun greens, goat cheese, cucumbers, kalamata olives, candied pecans and champagne vinaigrette. More greens than anything else: there were so few pecans we had to read the menu to discover what type of nuts were supposed to be included.

I ordered calamari with roasted pepper aioli. Excellent calamari, a hint of heat in the aioli, and a tasty marinara sauce.






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
