We hope to see you there as we start what we hope will be an annual event for our neighborhood.



#### Minutes of the Harrison West Society, November 14, 1991 Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. with Glenn Cook, president, presiding. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as

published in the last Harrison West News.

No treasurer's report was given.

Arrangements for the lighting of luminaries were discussed. The luminaries will be lit on the evening of the 8th of December. Things will start at the First Brethren Church at 2:30 p.m. that day. The publication of the News will be advanced a week to help get the information out. Volunteers have been found to take care of Vermont Place.

Lt. Robinson of the Columbus Police, who is our new zone lieutenant, was present to listen to our concerns and to discuss public safety. There was some concern about a spate of burglaries in the area. These have been committed by a black man approx. 5" 8", 150 lbs. and neatly dressed. Residents are urged to keep an eye out for this man and to pass any information along to the police and to cooperate with their neighbors. A persistent problem with breaking car windows and thefts from cars was also discussed. Despite this, the lieutenant reported that there has been no significant increase in crime in the area and that a number of cases had been cleared up by arrests for other crimes, usually drug - related, in near - by areas. Keeping an eye open and cooperation with your neighbors were encouraged to improve safety and to help the police, even without the preparation of a formal block watch.

If you are concerned with the crime rates, you can contact the Police Community Relations office and talk to Officer Howard Wilson who should be able to get you the

information you need.

The lieutenant reported that more police should soon be on the streets and this should increase coverage and response times.

Cathy Sindelar from Hubbard Elementary presented a list of needs that the school has. The most important of these is volunteer tutors. In addition, they also need Big Bear tapes, Campbell's Soup labels, book bags and school supplies to put in them as prizes, and food donations for Christmas.



If you are in a position to assist them in any of these areas please contact the school for further information.


They need Big Bear cash register receipts and Campbell's Soup Can Labels.


