Proposed Constitutional Changes Concerning Membership and Dues

Discussions of the last couple of months have yielded an improved definition of who may be a member of the Society and the method for determining voting for non-resident property owners businesses. Classifications membership have been created for the purpose of defining levels of contributions by the membership. Allowing for maximum flexibility, the levels are to be determined without restriction by a majority vote of the Society.

PROPOSED TEXT OF ARTICLE III ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

A. Membership shall be open to all residents, non-resident property owners, businesses, churches and other institutions in good standing in the community. Each member is entitled to one vote. Businesses, churches and other institutions are limited to one vote. Non-resident property owners are limited to one vote per entity (e.g. corporation, company or partnership) and not vote per property. Entities that share a common member or relationship shall be considered to have the interests of the whole represented by that one member and are limited to one vote. Members must be present at Society meetings to cast votes; no proxy votes from the Society. The Executive Board shall be permitted.

days after membership is offered by the Executive Board. For the 1995 election, there shall be no sixty day waiting period for voting privileges if the initial payment of dues is made on or before Thursday, May 11, 1995. Every reference in the constitution to March elections shall be changed to May or advanced one month as required in preparation and these last two sentences shall be deleted from the permanent record of the constitution after their purpose is served.

EXISTING TEXT OF ARTICLE III

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

A. Membership shall be open to all residents, persons owning property, businesses or institutions in the Harrison West area.

B. Upon approval of the Society, Associate Membership may be extended to persons, businesses and institutions having a substantial interest in the Harrison West area. Associate members may attend all meetings, serve on committees in an advisory capacity, participate in discussion, but are not entitled to vote or hold office.

C. Voting privileges shall be determined by written registration provided though the Harrison West News as well as at meetings of the Society prior to the annual meeting in March. After the annual meeting, voting memberships shall be extended only to new residents, new businesses, new institutions and new property owners in Harrison West.

D. Each member is entitled to one vote. Businesses, nonresident property owners and institutions shall have one vote per property. No member holding elected public governmental office may vote. During the term of his office he may sit in an advisory capacity on committees. No proxy vote shall be permitted.
