River Plan for Harrison West Looks Good, But...

Imagine a park stretching from OSU to Route 104 along the Olentangy and Scioto, studded with natural areas for quiet reflection; downtown night spots, museums and entertainment; boating access; picnic areas; soccer fields and public art. That's the Riverfront Commons Corp. (RCC) Riverfront Vision Plan.

The Harrison West Reach Plan calls for the natural bank along the riverfront to be maintained and enhanced for wildlife habitat. Trails will meander along the upper bank with occasional stairs, ramps and landings at the water's edge. Perry Street will extend south from Second Avenue to Michigan near Goodale as a parkway providing public access to new riverfront parklands and redefining the edge of the built environment. A new mixed use development area along Perry will encompass about 15 acres and will face the riverfront parks. New development on the river at Goodale will include easements for public open space along the river to achieve connection between Pen West and Harrison West. This is the good news.

Unfortunately, the timetable for this stretches 20 years! That's way too long for Harrison West to wait for its parkland.

Cleve Ricksecker, Executive Director of the RCC, will bring the Plan to the Harrison West Meeting Thursday, April 9 at the Godman Guild, 321 West Second Avenue, 7:30 PM. Come look at the plan and tell Cleve what you think, and urge him to begin on the Harrison West Reach immediately.

The Plan has yet to be adopted and funded by City Council, so your input is important.

Battelle Reveals Neighborhood Plans

Several months ago, Battelle invited activists from Harrison West in for breakfast and a candid discussion of what Harrison West envisioned for Battelle.

Did they get an earful! Harrison Westers thought Battelle should spruce up its grounds. Several people suggested that Battelle is full of smart, talented people, and the schools that serve Harrison West kids could use some of that brainpower and ability. Of course, several people thought it would be really neighborly if Battelle would donate the green space at Third and Perry to the City or the neighborhood for a park.

Perhaps the Harrison Westers were saying what Battelle was already thinking, or perhaps they gave Battelle some ideas. Whatever the reason, Battelle came back with some positive plans.

First is to freshen up the Battelle landscaping design. They've hired the architectural firm of Kinzelman Kline, who did the parking lot design for them, for that.

Last Chance to Save Quality of Olentangy

The future water quality of the Olentangy will be the issue at a public hearing at the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency April 23. Citizens will be asking for the best practical treatment of the river by the Ohio Dept. of Transportation when building SR-315 and I-670. This will be an opportunity to voice concerns and demand that negative impacts to the river be minimized.

ODOT plans to channelize a significant stretch of the riverbank with rock boulders downstream of Harrison West. Acres of mature trees along the river's edge will be cut and won't be replanted. Attend the hearing and let your state government know you want better treatment for your river and the Riverfront Commons Vision Plan for the Harrison West Reach.



What happens to stormwater runoff from new highway?

The Spring-Sandusky Interchange will more than double new pavement surfaces, creating 78 acres of hard surfaces, many of which will generate extremely high concentrations and annual loads of heavy metals, oils, grease, fecal coliform bacteria and oxygen-demanding substances. None of the stormwater generated by the new road surface will receive treatment before running into the Olentangy.

Heavy use of road salt is expected to generate concentrations of salt water approaching seawater, according to Federal Highway Administration data. In summer, the heated stormwater runoff from hot pavement will adversely affect aquatic life.

There's a fix, and it's simple.

Measures to minimize the oily sheen and these other nasty effects of stormwater runoff are easy to accomplish using grass swales coupled with detention ponds as part of the overall project. These attractive bioengineering techniques are in place along the SR-161 Expressway to New Albany, but they aren't planned for our neighborhood.

What happens to shoreline habitat?

Shade and woody plants on the riverbank are important contributors to water quality. The fish, birds, and other critters associated with shady tree-lined streams are

vastly different from those which can tolerate baking in the summer sun. ODOT proposes to replace about 1/3 of the natural, shaded shoreline in the project with artificial riverbanks composed of rock, concrete and other hard surfaces. The river will be more like a culvert in these areas than a river.

What about contaminated sediment?

The Olentangy River was a center of industrial activity after the Civil War and into the 1960s. Heavy industry produced so many contaminates that in 1904 the Water Plant at the mouth of the Olentangy was moved to its present location upstream on the Scioto.

Many of those contaminates remain in river sediment. A 1996 OEPA report documents "highly elevated" cadmium levels and 'extremely elevated" copper, lead and zinc levels. ODOT has no plans to deal with this contaminated sediment, though solutions would be to clean up the toxic metals or build the project around them without disturbing

What About the Vision Plan for the River?

This is your opportunity to tell ODOT and the OEPA that you support the Columbus Vision Plan for Riverfront development and parks along the Olentangy. If you plan to use the recreational trails and parks along the Olentangy, attend the public hearing, tell the state bureaucracy that it's not 1984 anymore, and demand that the highway project incorporate the best mitigation package available today, as ODOT already has done for the New Albany Expressway.

The meeting is Thursday, April 23, 7 PM at the OEPA, 1800 Watermark Drive (from Grandview Avenue at the I-670 entrance ramp, turn right at the traffic light onto Watermark Drive).





The Riverfront Commons Corporation (RCC) Vision Plan owes much to public input generated at three 1996 RCC Forums. The consensus from those forums was that Columbus residents want parks and open spaces with easy river access, as well as really great downtown entertainment venues on the river.

The Urban Oasis Coalition (UOC), an organization of neighborhood groups along the river, including Harrison West, Dennison Place, Victorian Village, Brewery District, Merion Village and German Village, has worked with the RCC for two years to guide them toward a Plan such as this.

According to UOC Spokesperson (and Harrison West resident) Steve Tway, "The Urban Oasis Coalition is generally pleased with the Plan. Now we must ensure that the parkland and natural areas get funded and built. Let's begin with the parks and Perry Street extension in Harrison West."

The Urban Oasis Coalition is particularly concerned that the proposed development will occur while the creation of public parkland is indefinitely postponed. City-owned land at Pen West and the Whittier Peninsula will be sold off and developed. The Coalition asks that City Copuncil also ensure the creation of public parkland.

It's an important issue for Harrison West. Come to the meeting April 9 to push for park funding.

Kinzelman Kline will be working along Third, Fifth, and the river, as well as the buildings and parking lots.

In addition, according to Battelle Community Relations liaison Margie Gilbert, Battelle is putting together an education program with the Godman Guild for an after-school science and

math program funded in part by the National Science Foundation. The program will serve the five schools in the Godman Guild area. They also will be sponsoring performing arts groups at the Godman Guild. On an individual staffer level, Battelle is encouraging its people to volunteer to mentor students at the neighborhood schools during the school

Don't get too excited about a Battelle park at Third and Perry ... it's not going to happen. Battelle confirmed that it will neither sell nor donate the property to the city. Though they tell us they have no plans to develop the property at present, Battelle Senior people are keeping their options open for the long term. They have said, however, that they will give the neighborhood right of first refusal if and when they decide to sell. So, no park. However, no change in the space for the future.

Most of this is good news, and shows what you can accomplish when you work with your neighbors.






This pleasant and homey coffee house at 691 N. High in the Short North is an eclectic delight for light meals, dessert and people watching, which is what we went for.


