### Society May Join Victorian Village and Dennison Place to Ask Judge to Assess Traffic Congestion Impacts on Character of Neighborhood

Traffic is bad now and it will get even worse once the "North Innerbelt" section of the Spring-Sandusky Interchange is rebuilt. Fortunately, there is hope for relief because Harrison West, Victorian Village and Dennison Place are recognized by the federal government as the Near Northside Historic District.

The Society could join with these nearby neighborhoods to ask a federal judge for help. By showing a judge that the Federal Highway Administration did not follow the National Historic Preservation Act, we may be able to get a formal assessment of traffic problems caused by the project, as well as solutions to these problems.

For example, changes to the highway design could reduce traffic in our neighborhood by making it more convenient for traffic to circulate at the edge of the neighborhoods. Goodale Avenue could function as a two-way arterial. The Michigan-Goodale and Neil-Goodale intersections could be configured to discourage cut-through traffic. Trucks bound for local businesses could be encouraged to use Goodale rather than Third and Fifth Avenues. Other solutions, such as money for traffic calming or new SR-315 OSU Hospital ramps, could result from a court case.

At the June 11 Harrison West Society meeting, we'll discuss whether to join with other neighborhood groups to take legal action. We'll talk about the costs and benefits, the pros and cons. We currently have a window of opportunity to act, but time is of the essence. See you there.

### Traffic Planners' Goal Is Gridlock

How's this for planning? At a recent meeting of neighborhood civic association leaders, traffic planners, and Columbus traffic engineers, the lead planner announced that his GOAL was for Neil Avenue to be one level above gridlock during morning and evening rush hours after Spring/Sandusky is finished.

Think about rush hour traffic, then think about what it would take to turn Neil Ave. from Goodale into Spring into a parking lot! If you've been bored by all this talk about traffic problems, you might want to pay attention now. If the *planners* are planning gridlock for our neighborhood, you KNOW we're in trouble. There is something we can do about it. Come to the meeting on June 11.

Motion to approve the minutes of the last HWS meeting; Tway motioned; Gilp seconded; Passed.

The HWS Public Art Committee met with the Ohio Arts Council on grants available in 1999. A very wide range of projects could be funded. All ideas are welcome.

The HWS Election of Officers was held. The nominated candidates were elected; Craig Copeland as President; Maddy Weisz as Vice President; John Cowin as Treasurer; and Keith Dimoff as Secretary.

Traffic issues were discussed, especially the impact of the Spring-Sandusky Interchange. President Copeland raised the possibility of taking legal action soon, such as seeking an injunction with the HWS as a coplaintiff. Following discussion of the costs and benefits of a lawsuit, no motion was made. Additional information will be available for the next HWS newsletter and meeting.

Brief updates on the Riverfront Commons plan, bike paths, the River Cleanup and Battelle were given.

Motion to establish the HWS Speakers Committee with Sandy Woolard as the Chair; Gilp motioned; Tway seconded; Passed.

Motion to adjourn; Dimoff motioned; Tway seconded; Passed. Adjourned approximately 8:30 PM.

### Michigan and Second Avenue Focus of Columbus Cornered at Columbus Museum of Art


Spanish artist Felix de la Concha moved to Harrison West in 1995. He wasted no time planting his easel at the corner of Michigan and W. Second Avenue to begin his first Columbus opus, One Season in Each Corner. Concha systematically surveyed the scene from each of the four corners in eight contiguous views, creating a total of 32 canvases. The works will be featured in Columbus Cornered: Paintings of Place by Felix de la Concha, on view at the Columbus Museum of Art from June 20 through September 13, 1998.

Harrison Westers will remember Felix, who painted in our neighborhood in 96 and 97. Usually on a corner, in all weather, Felix painted our neighborhood glowingly in great detail — storm drains and all.

His images of Harrison West join his series from cities such as Rome, Orvieto, Seville, and Madrid. He has had a number of solo exhibitions in Spain and Italy and has exhibited in several south American cities including Santiago, Caracas, and Buenos Aires.

Felix will be at the Columbus Museum of Art on Saturday, June 20 for a gallery talk. The personal tour will begin at 2:30 PM and will be followed by a book signing in the Museum Shop at 3 PM. A limited edition book, *Felix de la Concha: One Season from Each Corner*, will be for sale for \$18.95. The book includes 12 images from Harrison West.

The Columbus Museum of Art, 480 East Broad Street, is open Tuesday through Sunday from 10 AM to 5:30 PM and until 8:30 PM every Thursday.






Felix de la Concha painting on the corner in front of his apartment, June 1997 (left), courtesy of Steve Tway.

### Victorian Village Society and Friends of Goodale Park to File Lawsuit Against Federal Highway Administration

(The following is an article prepared for the Victorian Village Vibe. Its subject -- the impacts of the Spring/Sandusky interchange on our neighborhood -- is sufficiently important to Harrison West that we have run the article in its entirety. At the Harrison West meeting on June 11 this topic will be dicussed further.)

At the May meeting, the members of the Victorian Village Society voted to become a plaintiff in a lawsuit against the Federal Highway Administration due to long-term impacts on our historic neighborhood from the Spring/Sandusky Interchange. The Society allocated \$1,500 for the lawsuit.

We hope that the Harrison West Society, Dennison Place Association, and Italian Village Society will join us in the lawsuit. The board of trustees for Friends of Goodale Park is joining the lawsuit and also approved \$1,500.

In addition, the Friends of Goodale Park agreed to act as fiscal agent for donations contributed to the legal fund. Because FGP is a recognized charitable organization, that means that contributions to the legal fund will be tax-deductible to the extent allowed by law.

We need about \$10,000 to mount a credible legal effort (we're suing the federal government, which has the deepest pockets around). This means that an additional \$7,000 must be raised from YOU, the community. Donations of all sizes are needed -- \$5, \$10, \$50, \$100, \$500, and up! Please give whatever you can. The traffic committee believes, after years of struggle, that this lawsuit is our best shot at rectifying the situation and restoring peace to our village streets.

As an historic district, we are protected under federal law from impacts pertaining to traffic noise, visual intrusion, etc. The Federal Highway Administration has blatantly ignored its own rules while shoving commuter traffic down our throats. It's past time to fight

back vigorously, in a language they can comprehend. It's time to send a drastic message.





## Manhattan Bagel Offers Food for Everyone --**Every Meal**

This newish little restaurant in the Thurber Center on Neil at Goodale is good enough to be a destination eatery. More than breakfast bagels, the place offers sandwiches, muffins, pizza bagels, spreads, and salads.

We've eaten there ever since it opened and until now, our favorites have been the breakfast egg and Taylor ham sandwiches. Now that they've added green salads, we're making them a lunch and dinner destination, too.

Their meats are all 97% fat free. including a better-than-average pastrami and roast beef. The 11 flavors of cream cheese spreads include 3 that are low-

The new Salads -- Garden, Chef, and Chicken -- are about 10 ounces apiece, just large enough for a lunch salad or dinner side salad. Made fresh each morning, each is pre-packaged and ready to go. A good mix of quality ingredients, with Kraft dressings, make these an easy alternative to brown bagging it from home. They offer a Salad Combo with salad, bagel and drink, too.

Other Lunch Combos include your choice of bagel sandwich, your choice of macaroni or potato salad or cole slaw and a drink.

The muffins are huge, with just the right amount of fresh-baked crumble.

Bagels range in flavors from plain to the new cranberry orange.

Flavored coffees, cappucino, and a variety of self-serve juices and drinks round out the offerings.

This place is a lot like little delis we've tried in New York City, except that everyone is cheerful and friendly here!


