March 11 HWS Meeting

CABS, Safety & Good Neighbors

At the March 11 meeting of the Harrison West Society, representatives from the Campus Area Bus Service (CABS) will present a quick overview of their service. A CABS route runs on Neil Avenue between the Ohio State University and Thurber Village.

Also, a graduate of the local safety program "IMPACT" (formerly Fight Back of Central Ohio) will give a brief personal account of the tools to overcome violence that are provided by these self-defense courses and of the confidence-building that is supported.

Finally, a short business meeting will include updates on public art and other community efforts and a chance to talk with some good neighbors.

City Council to buy lot or negotiate easement?

Riverfront Land Attracts Attention

At the February 22 City Council meeting, President Michael Coleman asked for a report by the city administration on the vacant parcel at 579 West Third Avenue.

An application for funding for the city to purchase the lot or to acquire an easement has been pending since early December with the city's Urban Infrastructure Recovery Fund program. A February 18 article in the Columbus Dispatch quotes the city's Department of Trade and Development as saying that the funding request had been tentatively approved. The article also notes interest by the Recreation and Parks Department.

The lot was sold by the county last year by bid to the New Victorians. In February the Harrison West Society complained to the county that the sale contradicts the county's Greenwaysplan and the city's riverfront plans.

In a follow-up article, the February 19 Dispatch reported that the new owner was offered the cost of the land, \$13,500, but the offer was rebuffed. The article states that Joe Armeni of the New Victorians is willing to work on providing other public access to the site. The Olentangy River is adjacent.

In a March 3 letter, the HWS urged the city to meet with the owner to resolve the future of the land. The letter asks Coleman, "Could the city make a substantial offer for the lot, or at the least negotiate an easement?"

HARRISON WEST SOCIETY February 11, 1999

The well-attended meeting started at approximately 7:40 P.M. at the Godman Guild.

Mike Mentel, City Councilman, talked of his background and his priorities on city council. He answered questions from the audience, most of which concerned parks and traffic.

After a short break, the meeting resumed at 8:25 P.M. with Terry Sherburn, a local historian, narrating a slide show on the history of Goodale Park.

Introductions were then made around the table and the business meeting commenced at 8:55 P.M.

A motion was made to approve the January meeting's minutes as printed in the Harrison West News; Dimoff motioned; Weisz seconded; passed.

A motion was made to pay the routine HW News bills; Dimoff motioned; Weisz seconded; passed. A Treasurer's report was not given.

A Traffic Committee update was presented. Meetings and negotiations continue to be held on the impact of the Spring Sandusky Interchange. Representatives from the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation and the National Trust for Historic Preservation will be in town this month.

A Planning & Development Committee update was presented. Preliminary plans by the city for the bike path along the river from Third Avenue to King Avenue are available.

A letter has been sent to Battelle regarding its draft Master Landscape plan. The letter supported some proposals but also emphasized the need for a schedule and other concerns.

Another letter will be sent to Battelle based on the discussions at the January HWS meeting and the P&D Committee meeting. The letter will address the future of Battelle's vacant land along Third Avenue and on the southeast corner of Fifth Avenue and Perry Street.

An Urban Infrastructure Recovery Fund Committee update was presented. A letter has been sent to the county objecting to the sale of riverfront land at 579 Third Avenue.

A Public Art Committee update was presented. A grant application to the Ohio Arts Council to fund a community-driven design contest will be submitted.

The meeting was opened to the floor for new business.

Concern about a "mini-crime wave" was expressed. Reports of local crime included vandalism, a store burglary and a purse-snatching. The HW News will include an article on crime.

A motion was made to adjourn; Copeland motioned; Dimoff seconded; passed. The meeting adjourned at 9:05 P.M.

"My door is open" he promised at the meeting. Actually, his aide's door will be open. That's Bill DeMora. Both Councilman and aide may be reached at 645-8558.


During the second half of the meeting, Terry Sherburn, a local historian, narrated a slide show on the history of Goodale Park.


Public Art May be Coming to Harrison West

The bridge at Third Avenue







Eadie Gourmet Eats Out At Lemongrass

Finally, we're getting some decent Oriental restaurants in the area. Lemongrass, 641 North High, won my heart with some of the best Pad Thai I've had in years of searching. Rice noodles, shrimp, bean sprouts, and crushed peanuts are stir fried and finished in a semispicy lime-touched sauce. Excellent in itself, but even better when you stir in the generous garnish of shredded carrot and fresh cilantro. Ask for some chili oil if you like extra spice.

Two soups, two salads, and seven appetizers, including the ubiquitous portabella mushroom cap, whet the appetite for the exotic flavors to come.

Basil, lime, ginger, chilies and cilantro are traditional Thai seasonings, and Lemongrass uses them expertly. The Cilantro Chicken wok fries marinated chicken and crisp asparagus and laps them in a creamy cilantro sauce. Asian, yes, but continents away from most of the oriental chicken dishes served in Columbus.

It's too bad more Asian restaurants don't serve fresh fish. The Lemongrass fish de`resistance is Choo Chi Fish, a 10 ounce filet of orange roughy sauteed in spicy chili paste (hot!) and finished with fresh lime leaves and broccoli. This dish would benefit from a more flavorful fish, but still is worth ordering if only for the tasty contrast of chilies and lime.

Dessert is equally intriguing. I ordered coconut flan, which came flaming to the table, having been doused with almond liqueur and rum. Let the flames burn out naturally, it takes only a moment, then savor the smooth tropical custard. The flan actually is much better than the liqueurs poured so generously over the top. Carry out orders are welcome 224-1414.


