


Urban Infrastructure Recovery Funds

Every year, the UIRF money goes to neighborhoods such as ours to fund capital improvements. August 3 is the deadline for application submissions, and this year the Society is considering focusing on money to develop the new park near the Third Avenue Bridge.

Money to buy the lot for the park was previously secured by the Society through UIRF funding. The public art sculpture Side-by-Side will be installed on the site, which overlooks the Olentangy River at the southeast corner of the Third Avenue Bridge.

One proposal is to ask for funds to develop the park with a pathway, benches, landscaping and lighting and to tie it into the entry landscaping on Third Avenue as suggested in the City's traffic calming plan reviewed in last month's Harrison West News and as shown below.

HARRISON WEST SOCIETY MINUTES May 10, 2001

The meeting was called to order at 7:33 with a quorum of voting members present; President Keith Dimoff presiding.

Routine Business

Veda Gilp made a motion to approve the minutes of the last meeting. Passed.

Treasurer's Report Treasurer John Cowin reported more than \$3,000 in the treasury. Cowin motioned to pay the regular expenses of publishing the newsletter. Passed.

Planning and Development

A.C. Humko President Dimoff reported that the Humko land is now on the open real estate market and that Humko says that the earliest it would be expected to sell is by late summer.

Zoning President Dimoff reported

changes have passed.

Fifth & Perry Greenspace President Dimoff reported that Battelle has agreed to cover the extended cost beyond the initial \$5,000 budget to complete Phase 1 of the project this summer. The OSU students working with HWS on the design presented the current design for discussion.

Old Business and Committee Reports:

Membership Committee Chair Mark Hamsher reported 88 renewals or new members.

Newsletter Editor Veda Gilp reported the deadline for news and advertising submissions is the third Friday of each month.

Public Art Committee Public Art Committee Co-Chairs Maddy Weisz and Mandy Butler reported that Side by Side should be finished by the end of summer. BrickStreet Arts still is waiting on 501(C)(3) status, but needs at least \$10,000 now to finish. Vice President Mary Funk made a motion for the HWS to contribute \$1,000 to this Public Art project. Passed.

Urban Infrastructure Recovery Funds Chair John Cowin reported that

August 3 is the deadline for submissions. Ideas for the funding request were discussed, including the pocket park near the Third Avenue Bridge.

Traffic Committee Keith Dimoff announced that Pete Anderson's presentation of the neighborhood traffic-calming plan will be held following the business meeting and is also available on the NNHD website.

Police Liaison Officer Steve Smith reported that car break-ins are the major crime activity in Harrison West and encouraged residents to create a tough-on-criminals environment here.

New Business & Announcements:

Graffiti problems and ways to deter it were discussed.

The Martha Walker Garden Club has not received the city contract to maintain the Harrison West Park this year. The Club is available to provide flowers and mulch.

A newsletter covering multiple Short North neighborhoods has been proposed by a Dennison Place resident. Pastor Richard Morris made a motion that the Harrison West Society oppose the distribution of that newsletter in the Harrison West area and for HWS to ask to join the Short North Business Association. Passed.

The First Brethren Church Dedication was announced by Pastor Morris.

Elections Nominating Committee Chair Ken Wightman introduced the slate: Keith Dimoff for President; Mary Funk for Vice President; Veda Gilp for Secretary; Tom Maxwell for Treasurer. No other nominations were made from the floor. Wightman motioned that the nominated slate be elected by acclamation. Passed.

Mary Funk motioned to adjourn the business meeting at 8:45. Passed.

The traffic calming plan was presented and made available for Q&A.



Graffiti Must Go Fast!

People have been asking what to do about graffiti in the neighborhood.

Remove it as soon as you can. Use Enamel Reducer (found only at NAPA stores) on garages, concrete, paint, wood, where the vandals hit your property.

When you see graffiti on public property, go to the internet site http://refuse.ci.columbus.oh.us/graffitisubm.htm to find a form to complete that will steer the city's graffiti abatement people to the graffiti. Or call the Mayor's Action Line 645-2489.

Here's what the experts say about graffiti:


- 1. Increased resident anxiety, economic decline and the escalation of more serious crimes results when graffiti is left unattended in communities. The fear associated with graffiti is more pervasive and damaging to communities than the number of associated criminal acts.
- 2. If graffiti markings are left up for seven days, there is a 100% chance of additional graffiti in the community.
- 3. The National Graffiti Information Network estimated the costs of graffiti vandalism to be \$7 billion in 1994. This number has risen since.
- 4. Even worse, graffiti signals that no one cares. When apathy pervades communities, there is no perceived deterrence to other more serious criminal and antisocial behaviors. And the affected neighborhood experiences a fast-moving downward cycle of crime and grime.

NORTHWARD SHIFT FOR FREEWAY RAMP TO OSU?

ODOT and Ugly vs Harrison West and Common Sense

The Ohio Department of Transportation, the City and the Ohio State University are planning the design of a northbound off-ramp and a southbound on-ramp to connect the OSU Medical Center with State Route 315. Two new bridges would be built over the Olentangy River, one of which would be a free-way ramp extending over the new, beautiful King Avenue Bridge!!

Steve Shinn, member of the Harrison West Society and the American Institute of Architects, has proposed shifting the location of the off-ramp further north. At a May 21 public meeting on the project, Steve noted many benefits from the shift, including the lessening of negative impacts on the King Avenue Bridge, the river, and traffic along King Avenue.

Fifth & Perry Greenspace Taking Beautiful Shape



Plans include benches, landscaping, and a patterned-concrete walkway to a focal point midway through the space.


Battelle has offered to pay for the improvements and has cooperated with the Harrison West Society on the design and implementation.

Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Dragonfly

That's the way the Dragonfly is: you may find the "king oyster calamari" to be tasty (I did), but those steamed chard ratatouille dolmas give dolmathakia a REALLY BAD name. If you're a true vegan, these dolmas may be the best you can do, but if you want a superlative dolmathakia, go to Anna's Taste of Greece on Sawmill north of I 270.

Dragonfly does wonderful salads. The spinach salad -- spring version, for \$6, -- was excellent. Avocado, ruby grapefruit, pickled red onion, and toasted almonds in grapefruit and sesame mojo, over various baby and frilly lettuces made for a very sprightly and intriguing salad. They also offer a simple salad of baby lettuces dressed with "45 year old solera aged sherry vinaigrette" which on another occasion proved superb.

For the main course, Dave ordered the "fusion," Mandy ordered the seitan piccata, and I had dragonfly churrasco. We ate them; we even liked most of all of them. But what did we eat? Here's what the menu says.

Dragonfly churrasco is "skewered grilled vegetables, basmati gallo pinto, tempeh empanadas, chimichum"

Fusion is "garam masala lobster + mastutake mushroom risotto cooked to order, fried hen of the woods, saffron tomato broth, lemon fennel aioli"

Seitan piccata came with "white truffle mashed gold potatoes, rapini, lemon caper sauce"

Your guess is as good as ours as to what we actually put into our mouths.

I have eaten in Central America at roadside stands set under some trees or a tin roof, next to a guy eating his lunch on his horse, ordering by the universal "point and grunt" method, and had a better idea of what I actually consumed. Dragonfly, I am sure, has a much cleaner kitchen, though their service may be slower and not so attentive.

By the way, a friend reported that his experience at Dragonfly was abysmal in terms of food and drink. "Never order the drinks," he orders. "You'll be sorry!" Actually, the listing on the menu, the "aren't we so clever" fly cocktails and fly virgin cocktails, was enough to put me off ordering a drink. We did order a bottle of Badger Mountain Johannesburg Riesling. We didn't know what we were eating, so it was hard to order wine to go with it. Mandy did well picking this one. It was a crisp, fruity, slightly sweet, summery wine, and we enjoyed it. It even stood up to the churrasco, which was slightly spicy in nature. Dave had an imported beer, and he enjoyed that.

For dessert, ah dessert. How can anyone who can cook ruin chocolate? They can't. And Dragonfly didn't. Perhaps the way to really enjoy Dragonfly is to eat dinner elsewhere, then stop in for the "chocolate factory," which is described as "warm chocolate bomb souffle style, coconut truffles, mango gelato." What it is in plain language is a fine warm, wet brownie, not too sweet, liquid center topped with a small scoop of incredible mango gelato, and two chocolately, coconuty candy truffles. Now that's CHOCOLATE! The whole thing was wonderful, and we scraped the plate clean.

Try Dragonfly and let me know what you think.

Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Dragonfly

Neighbors Mandy and Dave Butler and I recently tried Dragonfly neo-v cuisine at 247 King Avenue.

I must offer up a caveat -- when eating at Dragonfly, half the time you haven't any idea what you are eating, and the rest of the time you either can't pronounce it or can't remember it. I can't begin to tell you what we ate, except to say that there were lots of mushrooms and tofu in many guises. Since Dragonfly is trying to be upscale vegan and organic, and since good vegetables and mushrooms are not inexpensive, be prepared to spend some serious dining money.

The first time I tried Dragonfly, I didn't care for my food, so I was eager to see what they offered this time. The results of this experiment are conclusive: whether you like Dragonfly food depends upon what you order, what mushrooms are in season, and how the cook is feeling that evening. People seem either to love or hate Dragonfly; there is no middle ground for this restaurant.

We began with appetizers of the tamale of the day and the small-plate Mediterranean sampler. The tamale turned out to be "mole amarillo, black bean muneta," whatever that is. It was excellent! We never did figure out what really was in it, so we ate on faith. The Mediterranean sampler, which included steamed chard ratatouille dolmas, king oyster calamari, grilled seitan kabob, crostini, and herb infused olive oil, was a different matter. It was OK, but the three of us couldn't find enough we really liked on the plate to finish it.


