The meeting was called to order at 7:30 PM with a quorum of voting members present; President Keith Dimoff presiding.

#### **Routine Business**

Veda Gilp made a motion to approve the minutes of the last meeting. Passed.

Treasurer's Report Tom Maxwell reported that the Treasury balance is \$5,314.91 and gave details on income and disbursements. Veda Gilp made a motion to make it policy to pay the recurring newsletter expenses, rather than make a motion every month. Passed.

Planning and Development:

Committee Meeting Keith Dimoff scheduled a P&D committee meeting and asked for members interested in serving on the Committee to attend.

Variance Request for 1004-6 Oregon Avenue Dave Butler made a motion to oppose the original or revised variance request at the November BZA hearing. Passed. Dave Butler made a motion authorizing the P&D Committee to work with Brian Portez before the January meeting to negotiate variances and design we all can support. Passed.

HW Long Range Planning and Development Document Pastor Richard Morris made a motion to adopt the recommended document as presented by the P&D committee. Passed.

#### Old Business and Committee Reports:

Membership Committee Chair Mark Hamsher reported that membership now exceeds 100. Tom Maxwell made a motion for the Treasurer to budget for Membership Renewal mailing expenses. Passed.

Newsletter Editor Veda Gilp reported the deadline for news and advertising submissions is the third Friday of each month. Reported that the De-

cember issue would carry a State Farm insert. Also asked for input from members for articles.

Crime Mary Funk reported that Police Liaison Officer Steve Smith would not be back from leave until after the new year.

Holiday Potluck Dave Butler, reported for Chair Mandy Butler that the potluck will take place at 452 Vermont Place. Gilp made a motion to make \$250 available for potluck expenses. Passed.





#### New Long Range Planning & Development Document Accepted

The following is the official Harrison West Society planning document adopted by the Society at the meeting on November 8, 2001. It sets forth the goals of the neighborhood for future development, renovation, parkland, and traffic and parking.

Article VII. D. of the Harrison West Society Constitution and By-Laws reads:

"The Planning and Development Committee shall develop and maintain a long range document that meets the objectives of the Society

and can be used to represent the Society's goals and planning process and to review proposed projects, zoning changes/variances and report/ recommend appropriate action

by the Society." In order to fulfill this Article,

the Harrison West Society has adopted this Long Range Planning & Development Document for the Harrison West

Society:

For the southwestern "industrial" areas of Harrison West, including the AC Humko site, we support the following principles: There





Every time I've visited the buffet, they have crispy duck, which is twicecooked duckling, marinated, steamed and fried, sliced thinly and served on lettuce. So if you like duck....

Ilike their Szechwan green beans, which are spicy HOT! The best thing about them is the done-to-perfection tenderness of the beans. So often these beans are almost mush, but here they cook and season them right.

Hot sour soup, which comes with the buffet, also is very good, with exactly the right balance between the spicy hot and the agreeable sour. It's loaded with vegetables and red-cooked pork, too.

This is a popular Sunday dining spot, so you may have to wait, but usually not for long. Don't wait until the last minute to go, because after 7:30 or so, they don't seem to replace all the food.

China Dynasty is located in the back of the mall. Carry out is 486-7126.

# Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at China Dynasty

For some time now, Lauren Creighten and Molly McCracken and I have been hitting the China Dynasty in the Lane Avenue Shopping Center for their Sunday Buffet.

The buffet runs from 11 am to 8 PM, and at \$10.50 is a deal. The menu rotates, but you'll always find good pan Asian dishes, replenished sufficiently often that the crisp stays crisp and the hot remains hot. Ordinarily I wouldn't suggest an oriental buffet, since so many of the dishes require last minute attentions which they don't get on the steam table. China Dynasty is different. They fill their steam pans with non-fragile foods such as Mongolian beef, General Tso's chicken, and Hunan chicken.

They also don't load the pans up and let them sit until they are empty. Just a few servings are placed on the table, with servers replenishing frequently. The quality, preparation, and taste of the food is very good, and you will find a variety to appeal to any of your taste buds.

Generally you'll find six or seven appetizers, seven or eight entrees, and fruit and cake for dessert, plus the ubiquitous fortune cookie. The fortunes are good. Usually my fortune tells me I'm going to be rich. (Don't you hate the fortunes that preach at you?)

One of the usual features of the Sunday buffet is cold crab legs. If you're short, you'll need to stretch or to hustle around the buffet table, because they place them waaaay in the back. I don't know if this is because crab is a pricey item or because the manager decided they would look nice back there, but be prepared to exercise your boarding house reach.




