Harrison West looks terrific! The City departments who worked in our neighborhood during Neighborhood Pride Week spotted problems and helped people find answers and resources to fix those problems. They cleaned alleys and streets, tended our parks, repaired street lights and hydrants.

One of the most visible improvements – the derelict and abandoned house on Harrison between Fifth and Fourth which has been the despair of neighbors in the entire block was demolished by the City and hauled away. You could see property values shooting up all around the site.

The kickoff to Neighborhood Pride was the Saturday tree planting, bike path clean up, and picnic. Battelle handled the bike path cleanup and sent helpers to plant trees. Harrison West's own Craig Copeland put the tree planting effort together and did a fantastic job! His 20 volunteers planted 20 trees! (If you or a neighbor got a tree, remember it needs 20 gallons of water a week all summer.)

The Harrison West Society put together the cookout on the river for all the Saturday volunteers.

HWS June Meeting Changed to Wednesday, June 19

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 PM with a quorum of voting members present; President Keith Dimoff presiding.

Representatives of the City presented infomation and answered questions regarding Neighborhood Pride Week.

Routine Business

Pastor Richard Morris motioned to approve the minutes of the last meeting; passed.

Treasurer's Report Treasurer Tom Maxwell reported a balance of \$7,200.

Planning and Development:

Campus Partners and Broad Street Management Craig Copeland and Dave Butler reported that Campus Partners and Broad Street Management still are negotiating with HUD.

Traffic Craig Copeland reported that the City has promised to review the Truck Routing Plan developed by Harrison West. He reported that gateway entry features at Goodale and Michigan have been proposed by the City.

Old Business and Committee Reports:

Membership Committee Chair Mark Hamsher reported that renewals total 67. Barb Kobe reported that the HWS brochure is ready for final review. Tom Maxwell motioned to allocate \$500 to print 2,000 copies of the brochure; passed.

Crime Liaison Officer Steve Smith warned that theft from cars is still high in Harrison West. Member Jeff Doner reported that he had been menaced by a thug with a gun while walking his dogs. HWS Garden Club Craig Copeland reported that since the Bike Path cleanup would begin at 9, he moved tree planting back to 10 am.

Public Art Denise Aldrich, from BrickStreet Arts, reported that the Side by Side project is short of funds to finish the donor plaque and appealed for funds from the Harrison West Society. Veda Gilp motioned to give \$1,000 to Side by Side for the plaque; passed.

New Business & Announcements:

Donations Pastor Morris reported that the Fire Station on Third Avenue has requested a 32" television, rather than a grill or ice maker. Pastor reported that the television would cost about \$400, which sum already has been allocated.

Mary Funk motioned for \$150 to be allocated to purchase donuts and coffee for the police working the Heritage Festival; passed.

Mary Funk reported that the name Goudy Station for the Third Avenue fire station has reached the final round of City voting.

HWS Officer Elections Nomination Chair Bob Mangia nominated Dave Butler for President, Mary Funk for Vice President, Tom Maxwell for Treasurer, and Veda Gilp for Secretary. The four were elected by acclimation.

Dave Butler requested that the next HWS meeting date be shifted to Wednesday, June 19 because of a scheduling conflict. Butler motioned; passed.

Rick Kobe motioned to adjourn at 9:10 PM; passed.



Kroger provided dozens of hot dogs and buns, tubs of baked beans and potato salad for lunch for all the starving workers.






















I wanted to try Nida's Sushi, but the lines were so long so continuously, I never made it there. Got to believe they were doing sushi right.

Blues Creek Farm put out absolutely wonderful Meatloaf and an apple walnut sausage that could lure me away from Bob Evans.

Let's talk Italian. Sarafino's Italian Deli lured me back with a terrific roasted veggie, spinach, olives, and onion stromboli. I'm making myself hungry writing about it.

Pastaria made Lasagne Sugoluso with baby meatballs, hard boiled egg, and a perfect red sauce. Why bother to cook?

For sheer elegance, the winner was North Market Poultry and Game, which offered raspberry duck, terrine of turkey in puff pastry, and sliced duck breast with shiitake mushrooms. Duck lovers all around me were ooohhing and

aahhing with gustatory delight. The turkey, especially, was light and flavorful tucked inside its little puff pastry wrappers.

I must mention China Market's Pad Thai, which was excellent, very spicy hot and peanutty.

Firdous Express overdid on the servings, but no one complained about the spit-roasted Ohio lamb, served with portabella mushroom salad.

Flavors of India gave us Chicken Tikke Makni, Channamasala, Palak Panir, and Basmati rice. This translates to spicy chicken, spinach and fresh cottage cheese, and chick peas in sauce. Nicely balanced flavors offset the heat.

Listen up children, here's where the desserts begin.

Pure Imagination Chocolatier dipped enormous, luscious strawberries in glossy dark chocolate for a winning treat. These were the best!

Then I moved on to natilas with fresh fruit at Jose Madrid Salsa. Turns out these are a cream cheesy-type tartlet with sliced strawberries. Oh, so good.

Juergen's Bakery did Chocolate Mocha Mountain Tops, a dry mousse, flavored with rum and coffee, that I savored to the last crumb.


Mozart's outdid themselves with mini eclairs, petit fours, and a glittery marzipan peach with raspberry and cream filling.

Barry's NY Deli turned out a heavy New York-style cheesecake that went so well with a cup of Touch of Earth coffee.

I've always wanted to go to the North Market Apron Gala, and finally made it. If you haven't done the Gala, the fund-raiser for the North Market, put it on your calendar for next year. It was fun and fattening.

First up were the appetizers from 7 to 9. This early in the evening, the crowd was thin, and it took no time to sample a little of everything and to go back for seconds of the really good stuff.

I followed the crowd to Curds and Whey for Chevre and Chutney wafers, Fromage and Affinois, Pate, Caviar Torte. They should sell Caviar Torte all the time. Great - even if you aren't fond of caviar. The Mousseline Pate was even better.

Tapatio was baking up aromatic and flavorful blue cheese-walnut and cranberry focaccias stuffed with roasted red pepper and black bean hummus. Hot and smooth.

Best of Wurst served sweet, thick Gazpacho and a delicious African Turkey Salad rich with pine nuts.

Pastaria delighted the crowds with smoked chicken raviolis with parmesan cheese and olive oil. The line got longer when people discovered the deluxe baby greens with raspberries, blue berries, yellow raisins, and balsamic dressing. Yum!

Jose Madrid Salsa did a Chile Verde Tartlet that was sooo spicy and good, I made a second pass.

At 8 PM, the Main Tastes were set out. Bob, "The Fish Guy" offered up excellent crab cakes thick with crab and a horsy sauce with a kick.
