Now if the City decides to make a gateway feature at the new Connector, they'll need to tear everything out and begin again.

Once again the City missed the opportunity to plan for the future.


Here are the Facts About Neighborhood Link

Harrison West Crime Spree

After all these months of low crime or no crime, Harrison West has been flooded with a regular tsunami of crime. Victim reports indicate that most of it seems to be perpetrated by a group of 6 to 10 preteens and teens with no respect for persons or property and way too much time on their hands. Incidents of racist and homophobic name calling; threats against dog walkers; egging of cars; vandalism, spray painting, and graffiti against cars, fences, and buildings; car break-ins ... the list seems almost endless and downright frightening in our small, friendly neighborhood.

Police Liaison Officer Steve Smith tells us to report the crimes to the police as soon as they occur. Just because it's "only" graffiti on your garage door or egg on your car doesn't mean it shouldn't go into the police data base. Call 645-4545. Officer Smith says the neighborhood must be proactive about stopping this mini crime wave before it escalates into something much more serious.

The Harrison West News has been printing lists of crimes reported to the police, but we've missed many of these crimes because they haven't been reported. If you don't report it, we can't print it, and your neighbors won't know to watch out for similar instances. City Disappointing Harrison West on Traffic Calming Again

After more than 22 months of meetings and work, after about \$100,000 in fees to nationally-recognized consultant Gladding Jackson, after miles of promises to Harrison West and all the Near Northside neighborhoods, after a Memorandum of Agreement signed by the City, after approving the Gladding Jackson plan on January 30, 2002, it looks as if traffic calming is on hold. Again.

The City is rethinking the cost. Again.

The City is coming back to Harrison West on July 10 with prices and options. Again.

The City is telling all the Near Northside neighborhoods that their own traffic consultants' (that would be Gladding Jackson) plans are too expensive. Again.


The Harrison West Traffic Committee offered to work through the technical reasons why the consultant's plan is too expensive. Again.

Is Harrison West asking too much?

Gladding Jackson didn't think so. Gladding Jackson, the City's own consultants, thought Harrison West and all the Near Northside neighborhoods deserved even more than we were asking.

We want traffic calming fixtures that are architecturally appropriate to our 120-year-old National Register of Historic Places neighborhood. We want materials that fit into our historic neighborhood. Not mounds of asphalt.

Let's see what the City brings to the table on July 10.





What Do You Think About Commission Status for Harrison West?

If you've looked around the neighborhood recently, you've noticed that there's a good deal of building and sprucing up going on. Sooner or later, AC Humco will sell and that land will be developed, right on our southern border.

In light of all this, the Planning and Development Committee voted on June 26 to pursue a fact-finding effort to become more informed on the various commission options that may be available to the Harrison West neighborhood.

The Committee felt that there may be a lot of misinformation and misconceptions out there from the stories some have heard about other commissions in Victorian and German Villages. The Committee wanted to determine what the pros and cons are of having a commission

here in Harrison West so that an informed decision could be made. The hope is that a Commission would prevent things like an absentee landlord replacing the one-over-one windows in a building with side-by-side-sliders. Or a Commission might be able to prevent a motel-style apartment complex from being built on one of our vacant lots.

Commission status will be discussed at the July 17 Harrison West Society meeting so anyone with feelings one way or the other should plan to attend. Thanks go to Holly Stein for graciously "agreeing" to lead this fact-finding effort.



Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Brazenhead

Tom and Steve decided that when in an Irish pub, one drinks ... beer. They ordered a Blue Moon ale and an Arrogant Bastard beer, both on tap. My, my. If American beer tasted this good, I'd probably drink it. About 10 beers and ales are on tap at Brazenhead, with another 30 in bottles. Yes, you can get a Bud Light. But who would want to, when you could be diving into the rich, hoppy, wheaty, dark smoothness of an Arrogant Bastard with its head of luscious amber foam?

Remember that this is a bar serving bar food: appetizers, salads, and sandwiches. That said, I'm happy to tell you it's about the best bar food I've ever had!

We started with grilled tomato and black bean vegetarian soup. A very southwestern taste, with definite smoky grill flavor, cilantro, and a hint of spicy heat to finish. Excellent!

Only one thing remains of the Gottliebs which once occupied this

space, and that's the 5th Ave. classic house salad with bacon and blue cheese. It tastes almost the same, too.

Once you've had your fix of the Gottliebs salad, though, venture further afield to the truly fine balsamic and gorgonzola salad with mesclun greens, sundried tomatoes, and pine nuts.

Tom ordered the Irish Ruben turkey with Swiss cheese, Irish sauce (a spicy take on thousand island dressing), and Tabasco slaw. Best quality ingredients; hearty rye bread grilled in butter and the real turkey stacked high made this an outstanding choice.

That Tabasco slaw, with sweet red peppers and parsley, packs a kick, and grows on you until you discover you've finished it off.

Steve ordered the Mondo burger, blackened, with pepper jack cheese. Huge burger, juicy, flavorful, cooked just the way he ordered. Not as good as Max and Ermas, but a lot closer when you need a big burger fix.

Brazenhead touts its fish and chips basket of Guinness-batter dipped Atlantic cod served with house-made potato chips. Unless you have a real man-sized appetite, this basket will be too much of a great thing.


Go with the fish sandwich with chips. Five ounces of batter-dipped fish makes a hand-sized slab of fish on a big, rich egg bun. Crispy batter; firm, moist, flaky, great-tasting fish ... this is my new favorite fish sandwich.

Brazenhead sandwiches include corned beef on rye; chicken salad on a real croissant; a stacked turkey club; fried bologna; and a portobella melt with grilled onions, arugula, mozzarella, and aioli.

As for those housemade chips, Tom and Steve ate every last crispy bit.

Brazenhead does not offer – gasp – dessert!

So I took us all out to the Rome-Hilliard exit off I-70, where Handels Homemade Ice Cream, a newcomer from Akron, is dishing up the world's best chocolate ice cream to long lines of new devotees. Their speciality is chocolate pecan, but I never can get past the incredible Chocoholic Chip. If you're especially in luck, they'll also be making cherry cordial ice cream and you can sate your ice cream cravings with a scoop of each under a giant Western sky.





Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Brazenhead

Brazenhead Irish Pub, 1027 W. 5th, looks great on the outside, but I've had reservations because (A) Irish pubs are not known for their gustatory delights and (B) the buzz is that it's a meat market.

Last Thursday, neighbors Steve Schab and Tom Maxwell and I set out to see what Brazenhead was all about. My initial fears were realized as we pressed through the crowds of attractive, firm, gym-toned young flesh (whew! forgot what I was reviewing!). Brazenhead *is* a meat market.

If you go to eat and talk, avoid the large central bar areas on both floors and look for the tables tucked away in the corners. If you want to drink, see, and be seen, stand in front of the bar, which approximately about 300 beautiful 20-somethings were doing. Another 200 were on the patio.

Parking, even in crowded Grandview, was easy. Brazenhead has signs everywhere directing you to lots that during the work day would be filled with factory-worker cars. By the time we got there, the pickups and vans were gone, replaced by Jettas and Jeeps.

Tom found us a place way in the back in one of their little snugs just large enough for two tables, away from the bodies and the noise. It was delightful, all dark wood and fabrics and a minuscule gas fireplace, and the noise level was just fine for our delicate middle-aged ears.

Heather, our perky, very attractive waitperson, appeared almost immediately with menus and offers to take our drink orders.
