
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
Neighborhoods Present Traffic Plan to City

On November 5th, the Near Northside Historic Neighborhoods met with City planners and presented an alternative traffic mitigation proposal. This plan proposes strong "gateway" entry features around the perimeter of the neighborhood and incorporates a number of strategic "bumpouts" and "traffic islands" as a means to prevent motorists from cutting through the neighborhood and to maintain 25 mph while traveling through. This neighborhood plan was a response to the City's plan that was presented last month. It would be a good fit were Harrison West to join The Short North Neighborhood Foundation (SNNF), because many of the Harrison West Society goals are the goals of SNNF.

The SNNF current focus is the establishment of pocket parks throughout the Short North.

A Pocket Park is a tiny green space that can be found in an unexpected place. The Short North Special Improvement District (SID) has identified at least 20 unexpected spaces on High Street in the Short North Art District. The

vision for these parks comes through the efforts of the SID to create a total environment in human scale. (SID's first project - the arches over High Street - is already under construction.) For the Pocket Park project, SID already has resources of staff. seed money from the area property

owners' self-tax, monetary commitments from the City of Columbus and COTA, the energy and enthusiasm of volunteers and residents, and the support of all the Short North neighborhood organizations.

From the sushi, we moved on to noodles — cold buckwheat for Jean, hot buckwheat with tempura for me.

Jean's cold soba noodles in broth had little flavor — that was provided by the soy-based sauce and seasonings that came in a separate bowl. She knew how to eat cold soba noodles. Grab some noodles with your chopsticks, dunk into the bowl of sauce, and eat. I think there was miso, as well as garlic and ginger in the dipping sauce.


My tempura soba noodles had a goodly amount of vegetables in the bottom of the bowl, and the tempura on top — a piece of shrimp, eggplant, and sweet potato — was excellent.

I always take the tempura out as soon as I get the bowl, otherwise it gets so soggy it's inedible.

Japanese restaurants don't do much dessert, so we went to Handles Ice Cream for a flavorful fall treat — pumpkin pie ice cream.

Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Kikyo

Several weeks ago, Jean Godby, Ph.D., and I found ourselves at Kikyo on Rt. 33 at Fishinger Road. It's set back in a strip center behind the Figlio patio area, so you must look for it. Once found, it's a delight. Later in the evening as the restaurant filled up, more non-Japanese came in, but when we sat down, we were the only non-Japanese in the place. A good sign for a Japanese restaurant.

We began with edamame — green soy beans, boiled in the shell, then salted. You pop them out of the shell into your mouth and they have a fine, fresh sweet green taste. The shells are extraordinarily salty, so unless you want to guzzle Japanese beer all through dinner, better go the popping route.

We also ordered pan-fried pork gyoza, those little half-moon dumplings the Japanese do so very well. These were wonderful gyoza, as good as any I ever had in Japan. More filling than wrapper, made on site, flavorful, steamed then fried, and delicate. If only we had had more stomach room!

We mixed our own dipping sauce from oils and soy sauce on the table, and had to request hot chili oil as well as garlic paste. (Just call me Vlad.)

Kikyo does good sushi. We sampled tuna, shrimp, squid, and salmon. Everything was of above average quality except the shrimp, which was dry and flavorless. When you eat raw shrimp, it should "pop" in your mouth with sweetness and just a hint of sea. The squid was flavorful but chewy -but raw squid is like that. Overall, we gave the sushi a positive nod.
