## Side-By-Side Art Park construction update

The two Side by Side sculptures have been waiting for their lights and landscaping for six years, but the wait is over. The Side by Side Park at the Third Avenue Bridge will finally get built beginning this Spring.

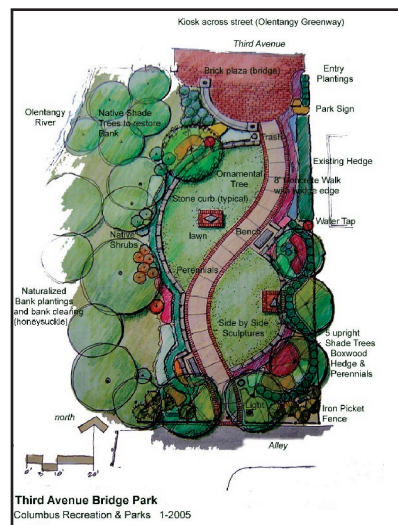
Bidding is finished, and the contract has been awarded.

The Side by Side Park was funded by Urban Infrastructure Recovery Funds, which have just now been appropriated. The park design was begun by the Harrison West Society, tweaked by Schmidt Land Design (now POD), and finalized by Molly McDonnall of the City. The Harrison West Society approved the final design at a meeting several months ago. Bob Mangia, who has been volunteering as caretaker of the park for years, has been the liaison between the Society and the City.

That means a lot to those of us who have weeded, worked, and partied there.

Side by Side is the result of efforts by former Harrison West President Maddy Weisz and member Mandy Butler to bring public

### *Minutes*

### *Commission Discussion*

Dave Butler led the discussion of the pros and cons of instituting an Architectural Review Commission. Pastor Morris motioned to proceed with the establishment of an Architectural Review, and after consideration of all options, to move forward with an Architectural Review Commission; Passed with two nay votes. Chris Ruder motioned that the President appoint a committee to pursue Architectural Review Commission status; Passed.

### *Kaufmann's Spring Fling Fund Raiser*

Veda Gilp reported that sales of the tickets are proceeding, and reminded everyone present that this could be a money maker for the Society.

### *Crime Report*

Crime Officer Steve Smith reported that while December was quiet, January crime was up.

### *Planning and Development*

Dave Butler reported that the revisions of the Riverfront Vision Plan for the Harrison West Reach are in the final stages. The next meeting will be March 7, at 6 PM at the First Brethren Church.

Motion to support the Association without commenting on the merits of the application; Passed.

### *Development Issues*

Dave Butler reported that a developer wants to remodel five units on Perry; Rob Harris reported on this proposal. Mary Funk motioned that the Society approve the proposal if the developer: turned the first unit into a two bedroom and added a front door on the street, make sure the structure is safe with the added story, turn two units on each lot into one unit with two bedrooms, and agreed not to pursue additional parking for the 10 new spaces needed; Passed.

The next meeting will be March 16, 7:30 PM at the First Brethren Church.

Pastor Richard Morris motioned to adjourn; Passed.

Many people are under the impression that an officer will be dispatched after reporting a crime. In reality, most police filings can be accomplished by a simple phone call.

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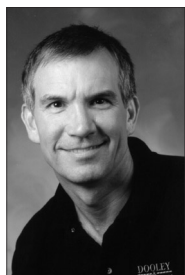

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# Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Network Restaurant

The new Network Restaurant at 525 Park Street,, just behind the Greek Cathedral, is awesome! Very retro; I expected to see Fred and Ginger whirling around the floor in a flourish of tuxedo and long skirts. Music is 50s and 60s Dean Martin and Frank Sinatra crooning from large speakers everywhere in the cavernous space which is cleverly divided into rooms by not-quite-ceiling-height walls.

Reservations are good, but not necessary. The beautiful youngsters for whom this place was designed aren't fully in place yet.

The menu reads "wonderful," but the food needs work. Quality is high, but taste is all over the board from bad to great. I loved the place on sight, and I'm telling everyone to go, but if you do, be prepared to send food back. At these prices, you should expect and receive "exceptional" taste. And the Chef won't know the food isn't up to expectations unless it comes back to the kitchen.

There's a raw bar, and several people who indulge in such have reported that it is fine indeed, with

very high quality seafood that is very fresh.

Salads, however, are so refined as to have virtually no flavor. Tom Maxwell, who was acting as Mr. Eadie Gourmet, commented that one should bring salad dressing from home! The house salad is a very nice mix of spring greens supposedly tossed with chardonnay-poached pears, Stilton cheese, toasted pistachios and toasted onion vanilla vinaigrette. There was no evidence of pears, poached or otherwise in our salads, and the Stilton cheese probably wasn't. The vinaigrette needed more vinegar and less sweetness. An artichoke and spinach dip was poached in Kirsch and savory herbs, finished with cream and melted Gruyere cheese and served with fried tortillas. My brother's is better, and his never saw Kirsch. It was so bland that we "borrowed" a bottle of hot sauce from the bar and spiked it.

Finally -- some flavor! It sounds good, but until this chef beats his battle of the bland, forget it. Similarly the lobster bisque was

too bland, too thick, too ho-hum. There were bits of lobster in it, so we knew it was the real thing, but frankly, it tasted as if it came out of a Campbell's can. The menu says it contains burnt brandy, and I think they burnt it too much.

You all know I love calamari, but I won't be recommending Network's calamari "steak" until it gets better. A friend ordered this here, and a piece of nearly raw calamari fell out of his roll of steak. Again, a dish with more ambition than follow through.

Now to the good stuff. You knew I would get there, since I'm telling you to go to Network. The entrees are huge -- make that HUGE! Tom's lasagna was about the size of a brick, covered with Alfredo and house marinara sauces. I had part of it; he ate his fill; and still there was about 10 ounces of it in his go box. And it was delicious! Just the right mix of pasta and meat and sauce. It seems pricey for lasagna at \$17, but since it comes with a house salad you can share (remember to bring salad dressing), and there's enough lasagna for two,

it works out to be excellent value for a couple.

My crab cakes served with charred vegetables and lemon caper rice, garnished with spicy mayo, tomatillo sauce and shredded fried potatoes were wonderful.

Everything on the plate was perfectly imagined, perfectly assembled, perfectly cooked, and perfectly presented. So much crab in the two big cakes that I'm amazed they stayed in shape. This pretension of "charring" vegetables often results in burnt veggies, but these were wonderfully flavorful and cooked just to tender. Actually the veggies and the rice were so good, I got the leftovers in a go box.

There's also lamb, pork, filet mignon, ribeye, salmon, pasta and gumbo, as well as an assortment of chicken and some duck.

Of course a trendy restaurant has trendy martinis. I was tempted by a dessert martini; they sounded so good! But I was driving, and stuffed, so we passed on dessert of any kind - even chocolate.
