HARRISON WEST SOCIETY MINUTES October 19, 2005

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM with a quorum of voting members present (27); Vice President Rob Harris presiding.

Routine Business

Minutes Debby Colvin motioned to amend the August minutes to say that the Society would spend up to \$50 a month on the Seniors if no other donations had been made and to amend the September minutes to say that a MOA with the City about caring for the parks was discussed; Passed.

Treasurer's Report Treasurer Tom Maxwell reported that the Harrison West Society had a total of \$7,225.

Old Business and Committee Reports:

President's Report Vice President Harris reported that the HW Executive Committee develops the agenda.

Harris reported that the first draw on the TIF funds is approaching, and the Society needs to prioritize expenditures. *See related article on Page 6.*

Executive Committees

Audit Chair Chris Ruder reported on procedures.

Communications Chair Stephanie Tresso reported that Jim Slone's web design is almost finished and that the winter mailer is in progress. Committee to meet October 24.

Civic Relations Pastor Richard Morris reported that the CHN has not made a stand on the conservation district issue.

Conservation District Chair Seth Rothey reported Lelia Cady,

Councilwoman Maryellen O'Shaughnessy, Pam O'Grady, Council of Historic Neighborhoods, and City Dir. of Development Mark Barbash want to meet to discuss the issue. Veda Gilp motioned that the HWS should support signatures rather than placing a conservation district on the ballot; Passed.

Membership Chair Tony Celebrezze reported. It was decided to send a postcard to every member early in November, follow up with a full letter in January to everyone not a member. Also send two mailings to members for the holiday party. He is looking for people to help update the bylaws.

Elections Committee It was announced that we need a replacement for Tom Robinson to the Short North Neighborhood Foundation and for Doug Swartz to Friends of Goodale Park.

Parks Committee Co-Chair Debby Colvin reported that she and Jerry Colvin, Doug Swartz, and Scot Robinson spent two hours weeding the Harrison West Park. Need more volunteers for park care. Chair Bob Mangia said Side by Side Park is waiting for irrigation.

Social Committee Chair Tim Bledsoe reported that the Marathon party was a success again, but that next year we need livelier music. His group is gearing up for the holiday party. B. Hamptons has volunteered their space for the party.

City Council Approves Harrison West Plan

On October 24, the Columbus City Council approved the Harrison West Plan, turning it into law.

What does this mean to you? It means that if you want to make a new curb cut for a driveway -- the City won't allow it. If you want to tear down a single family home and build an office building, the City won't allow it. If you want to paint your front door orange -- who cares?

The Harrison West Plan is both a policy document and an agenda for action - a "blueprint" for future neighborhood growth and redevelopment. In the coming months and years, the Plan's recommendations and strategies will serve as a reference, guiding decision-makers in the protection of historic assets, the preservation of neighborhood character, and the identification of significant infrastructure needs.

The Plan recommends:

- 1 taking inventory of the neighborhood's architecture and historic structures
- 2 establishment of a Neighborhood Conservation District or a review commission
- 3 nomination of eligible properties to the National Register of Historic Places
- 4 development of architectural guidelines for use in development review
- 5 planning for landscaping and sound mitigation along S.R. 315
- 6 completion of capital improvement projects already planned/programmed
- 7 replacement of fencing along the Michigan-Goodale connector
- 8 preservation and extension of the existing street grid
- 9 installation of median and cross-walk improvements
- 10 prohibition of additional curb cuts along neighborhood streets
- 11 use of UIRF and capital improvements funds to enhance planned projects
- 12 relocation of the pole-mounted signage at Michigan Avenue and Goodale Street
- 13 increased enforcement of the speed limit along Goodale Street
- 14 enhancement of neighborhood intersections
- 15 a 30 ft. pavement width for all new streets, to allow for on-street parking
- 16 installation of sidewalks, treelawns, and street trees as properties are developed
- 17 relocation of utility lines below ground, if funds become available
- 18 an upgrade of the light fixtures along Third Avenue and Fifth Avenue
- 19 installation of decorative lighting if property owners choose to be assessed

Harrison West Society Prioritizing Ideas on How to Spend TIF \$Millions

The TIF funds will be available to Harrison West Society soon, and the Society is working to prioritize spending plans.

First on the list is reimbursing Wagenbrenner Realty for purchase of the Compton property for the riverside park and for the design and construction of the park.

This should leave about \$600,000 from the first disbursement to spend on other priorities. Decorative streetlights throughout Harrison West lead the list. After that, suggestions include dressing up street corners, adding public art, and rebricking our streets. This will be discussed at the November 16 Harrison West Society meeting, 7 PM, First Brethren Church, corner Third and Oregon.

- Perry is being rebuilt from 2nd Ave. to Quality Place
- Putting in landscaped traffic island between First and Second
- Putting in new sewer line

- Restoring 5 ft. treelawns and 5 ft. sidewalks
- Houses curve in to make room for the landscaped island

Coffee and juice or milk are extra, but Bethany and I didn't mind. We had about half a gallon each. Seth, not a coffee drinker, had apple and grapefruit juice. Good stuff, definitely not from a can.

We all were so impressed with the quality of the ingredients of everything we tasted, that the pancakes were a major disappointment.

Those pancakes were worse than the ones from the grocery freezer section that you heat up in

the toaster! Real maple syrup, real butter, but YUCK pancakes.

Did I mention how good the coffee was?

Since the kitchen is so small, the buffet is all they do until after 2 PM on Sunday. After that, the regular menu is available. It looked pretty good, too.

Definitely try the MoJoe Sunday brunch -- 10 to 2 PM and under \$13. Just don't bother with the pancakes.

Seth Rothy and Bethany Bell and I found a terrific place for Sunday brunch at MoJoe Lounge/ Cup O' Joe on the Cap recently. The food was good, the service was good, and the price was good. Can't beat that.

First thing in the door, the aroma of excellent coffee wakes you up. Ahhh; just bring me a tubfull and let me dive in.

The hot buffet runs to the usual breakfast offerings: hash brown potatoes, sausage, bacon, scrambled eggs, and pancakes. The thrill for me was that everything was good -- well, not the pancakes, but that's another story.

The scrambled eggs were creamy and eggy.

The sausage and bacon were top quality. Bethany and I agreed the sausage is much better than what they serve at that big red barn-looking breakfast place.

The green beans were a little garlicky and crunchy. Delish!

You can order up an omelet any way you want it. We ordered a sampler -- veggie with cheddar, sausage and cheddar, and everything with three cheeses. The veggies were fresh and still slightly crisp. The omelets were stuffed full, and frankly, had a bit too much cheese for me, but no one else was complaining. I liked all of them.


