Routine Business

Minutes Pastor Richard Morris motioned to approve the minutes of the last meeting; Passed.

Treasurer's Report Treasurer Becky Borlaza reported \$2,867.86 in the checking account, and \$5,000 in savings and CDs.

Old Business and Committee Reports:

President's Report VP Funk reported that President Rob Harris will be undergoing some medical procedures and will be missing several meetings. Bob Mangia motioned that Rob continue as President while on "medical leave;" Passed. Pastor Morris motioned to spend \$60 on a planter to send to Rob as soon as he may receive flowers; Passed.

Budget and Finance Chair Scot Robinson was not in attendance; Treasurer Borlaza reported for him on the \$2,500 in savings and the \$2,500 in a CD with 5/3 Bank.

Civic Relations/Conservation Chair Pastor Richard Morris reported that the Council of Historic Neighborhoods is moving forward on preparing a new brochure, and that the Harrison West part of the brochure should be updated. Veda Gilp will send a new CD with HW pictures. Stephanie Celebrezze will write new copy.

Conservation District Pastor Morris reported that the City is moving forward on the legislation and that Harrison West sill is in the running for a spot. Constitution and By Laws Chair Chris Ruder made a Report 1 as well as a Policy Proposal. P&D Chair Jacob Sukosd reported that the owners of the new build at 400 West First Avenue had been cooperating with the Society. The owners, Patra and Costa Souhleris, were present to show new drawings, and described a City-mandated garage setback of 7 feet, plus centering the house in the space, plus a fire wall on the west side to meet fire codes. Committee is satisfied with the changes, and Jacob motioned to send a letter of support for the variances to the BZA; Passed. **Social** Chair Tim Bledsoe will be



A Bright Idea

Many homes in Harrison West have beautiful gardens featuring a variety of trees, shrubs and flowers. But as night falls, these gardens become lost in the darkness, except for those illuminated by the harsh light of street lamps. Installing landscape lighting adds safety and security to a yard or garden at night. It is also a simple way to highlight garden features which proud homeowners want to display, such as a Japanese Maple, much as an art collector would illuminate a prized painting.

Landscape lighting comes in two forms: solar powered and 12-volt low voltage. Solar powered lights utilize batteries that recharge during the day through small solar panels to power highefficiency LEDs, or light emitting diodes, at night. They are typically available as path lights or spot lights and can be installed in a matter of minutes, as they do not require wiring. The operating cost of these lights is nothing, aside from the cost of the light itself. The down side, however, is that solar lights typically produce only limited light output - sufficient for outlining a walkway but not enough for illuminating a tree. For true landscape illumination, I recommend low voltage lighting.

A low voltage lighting system is slightly more time consuming to install, but these systems produce brighter illumination than solar lights and can be much more elaborate. A system is comprised of a transformer that converts standard household voltage down to a safe 12 volts, direct burial cable, and any combination of lights. The endless selection of lights include path lights, spot lights, deck lights, and even accent lights shaped as rocks. The number of lights supported depends on the transformer wattage. For example, a 200 watt transformer would support either ten 20watt lights, twenty 10-watt lights, or any combination of lights that do not exceed the transformer wattage. Complete systems are available at home improvement stores for as low as \$100, though I suggest purchasing a set with metal light fixtures as they are much more durable than their plastic counterparts.



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I installed a low voltage system in the yard of my Oregon Avenue home in 6-8 hours. My system included four spotlights to illuminate a large tree and an ivy-covered fence as well as four mushroomshaped path lights along a walkway from our gate to the house. Installation was simple - I mounted the transformer, ran the 100 foot cable around the perimeter of the yard, attached the lights in my desired locations, connected the transformer, and tested the system. Once I verified that all

the lights were properly connected, I buried the cable in the ground approximately three inches down. The timer is set to turn on the system at dusk and shut off several hours later.

Installing a landscape lighting system is a great weekend project which can add value, security and beauty to your Harrison West home and garden!

I had the Happy Family for
\$7.25. I forgot that Happy Family shrimp, scallop, chicken, crab shape
and vegetables - was a basic white
sauce. This was pretty good, and the
vegetables were cooked perfectly, but
I prefer heat as in spice.

If you order it, ask them to leave out the crab shape - it doesn't add anything and the shrimps are very good.

Molly had Pad Thai Shrimp at \$6.95 and Lauren had Pad Thai Chicken at \$5.95. Inexplicably, Molly's Pad Thai was very mild, while Lauren's was medium spicy. Both were very good, with good

noodles, a good mix of vegetables and that indefinable peanutty taste that good Pad Thai has.

We all thought it was as good as what you get from Oodles.

The seafood in all three dishes probably was fresh-frozen, because it retained shape, texture and taste. Based on our experience, you could safely order any of the seafood dishes. My chicken was expertly cooked, as well.

I think the menu was put together by someone trying to cater to Ohio *and* Oriental tastes. That's how you get Happy Family and pickled mustard greens stir fried with shrimp on the same menu. I know the Oriental diners had things on their plates we did not recog-

nize: green things and yellow things on mounds of white rice.

I'm eager to know what "salt and pepper triple" or "salt and pepper shrimp" are. Here's a dish for the brave - jalipino (sic.) and peanuts stir fried with dried anchovy.

This place seems to offer good value. There are lunch specials for under \$6 served with rice and a drink or an egg roll. It just opened, so there will be a learning time before everything comes together.

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Eadie Gourmet Eats Out at Thai Tai

Listen up, folks, we have a new oriental restaurant close by -- and it's pretty good. Last week, Molly Maccracken and Lauren Creighten and I tried P.S. Thai Tai in the old Tim Hortons at King and North Star. (No, we don't know what the P.S. means.)

When we got there, the only other customers were Oriental, which we regarded as a good sign. Later, several Occidentals came in, plus some mixed couples, until we had a mini U.N. going. Everyone seemed to be enjoying their food. I know we did.

This is fast-food Thai, better for carry out than eat in, since there is no ambience whatsoever in the restaurant itself. It was clean and bright, but the foam plates and plastic utensils are the cheapest possible. Take it home and eat it with real tableware. It's not quite up to the culinary standards of Oodles in Thurber, and if you want really good Oriental, go to China Dynasty or Hunan Lion.

Lauren pronounced the eggroll good but slightly oily. I decided it was fine, but not as good as those served in the Rice Bowl on South High at Rt. 104.

The spring roll wasn't oily, being very crispy, but it was bland, since it was mostly Chinese cabbage and sprouts. It tasted OK, and even better dipped into some soy. The sweet-sour sauce has nothing special going for it. Try the chili oil that's on every table, instead.


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
