Message from the Nominees Nominee for President: Chris Ruder

We will need 60% of residents to approve of the Conservation Neighborhood for passage.

Elections Report Nominations for President are Chris Ruder, for Vice-President Mary Funk, for Treasurer Scott Robinson, and for Secretary Jim Slone. Election will be held at the May meeting and the new officers will take their positions starting in June.

Planning & Development The residents at 367-369 W 3rd Ave have requested a hardship rezoning from C4 to R2. This would enable them to obtain residential mortgage rates and insurance. There was no objection expressed at the meeting.

Social The annual Summer Block Party will be held the 1st or 2nd week of August. There was discussion about having it at Harrison Park Community House. Details to follow.

Advice from "Angie"

When I purchased a house on Oregon Avenue last year, I encountered a number of problems that owners of older homes typically face. The basement was damp due to poor site drainage. A heat register in a bedroom was moving very little air. An electrical circuit was constantly tripping. I enjoy working on minor home repair projects around the house, but some jobs require professional assistance. When it comes time to call in the pros, it is helpful to get referrals from friends, family and neighbors. But what if you don't know anybody who has hired a structural engineer, drainage expert, or other specialized contractor?

This is where a handy online service called Angie's List comes in. I

first heard about Angie's List on the radio and purchased a membership on a month-by-month trial basis. The site provides ratings and reviews from its members on local service contractors organized into many categories. It also allows you to sort the list to view only toprated contractors in each category or those located close to your address. You can also read actual member comments about services provided by contractors, even if a quote was obtained and services were not performed. I immediately used Angie's List to find a highly rated landscape and drainage contractor who provided me with a free estimate for installation of a perimeter drain and property grading at my home. The contractor subsequently performed the work in a timely and professional manner. I have since used the service to find

many contractors for various jobs and have also changed over to a discounted annual membership. Many contractors reviewed by Angie's List offer discounts and coupons to members of the service.

A membership-based contractor rating service such as Angie's List is an invaluable tool for homeowners tackling projects requiring professional assistance. I highly recommend it to my neighbors and fellow homeowners in Harrison West.

Garden Views: Planting Time

Over the next few weeks, most gardeners in Harrison West will plant their annual flowers in beds and containers. By following a few simple steps, a long blooming season can be achieved.

If you're planting a new garden, you'll first need to amend the soil. The best amendment for soil is organic matter. It increases water holding capacity and aerates the soil, while improving the environment for beneficial microbes. Compost or sphagnum peat are excellent sources of organic matter. Just spread either over the soil a few inches deep before turning under with a spade or tiller.

If you have started your own plants indoors, you'll need to harden them to outdoor conditions before planting. Just place them in a shaded area away from strong winds for a few days. Then gradually expose them to sunlight over two to three days. This step isn't necessary for plants purchased locally.

For fertility, I have found that the placing of a small amount (see package) of 6-month slow-release fertilizer below each bedding plant is an easy way to provide nutrition for the season. This method works great for ground beds, but don't use it in containers or baskets in sunny areas. My own experience is that heat from sunlight on a container can result in premature release of nutrients resulting in root damage. Liquid feed can easily be applied to container plants throughout the summer.

Proper plant placement includes correct sun/shade exposure, plant spacing, and color coordination.

Plants are rated for full sun, partial sun/shade, or full shade and usually do best when their requirements are met. It may take you a few planting seasons to get fully aware of the





light micro-environments around your home. For proper spacing of plants, check the seed packet, plant label, or catalog for planting distances and heights. Resist placing plants very closely to achieve an instant look. This can cause problems later such as legginess and disease. I'm not a fan of planting flowers in complete color mixes. Instead, I spend a good deal of time planning color themes

and beds. I feel that this aspect separates an average flower garden from a truly fantastic one.

Just before planting, tight root balls of bedding plants in cell packs need to be loosened with your hands to encourage root growth into the soil. If your plants are in peat pots, I like to remove the top half inch to avoid moisture wicking at the soil surface. Removal of the bottom four corners of the pot also encourages root growth. After planting, I always water in with half-strength liquid feed to get things off to a good start.

While you're planting, look around the garden and assess what kind of bloom power you see right now. If its very little, your garden may be in need of transition plants. These plants provide color between spring flowers and the blooms of midsummer. Two good choices, peonies and German iris, are both perennials that could be planted this fall. Two of the more unusual choices are foxglove and sweet William. Both of these biennials can be seeded in June and then planted outdoors in late summer. I'll talk more about this next month when I discuss the growing of Autumn annuals from seed.





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Bike Path Spruce-up Saturday June 9, 2007



Meet at the Battelle Warehouse parking lot by the Fifth Avenue Bridge (southeast corner of Fifth Avenue and the Olentangy River) at 9am for sign-in and work assignments.

Please bring your own weeding and mulching tools (shovels, hoes, rakes etc.) or loppers if you would like to do some pruning work, and work gloves. We will have extra work tools and gloves for those volunteers that cannot bring their own. We will also be picking up litter along the bike path from King Avenue to Third Avenue.

Children are welcome, but must be accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult. We will be working near the Olentangy River, and a busy bike path, so parents (or other responsible adults) must directly supervise their children at all times while participating in this event.

There will be some educational information about recycling for the children. If you might have helped to plant some of the trees along the bike path, you can use the opportunity to check on those trees. This

Birds of Harrison West

From rural woodlots and fields to the beautiful bluffs and ravines of Highbanks Metro Park, the 150 square miles that encompass the Lower Olentangy Watershed boast a wide variety of birds in summer that nest and raise their young. In fact nearly 100 species of birds nest in this diverse region of central Ohio each year!! Over a five year period from 2006-2010, this incredible variety of birds will be documented in all habitat types across the Lower Olentangy Watershed and the rest of Ohio with the Ohio Breeding Bird Atlas II.

Ohio's first breeding bird atlas was conducted from 1982-1987 under the direction of Bruce Peterjohn and Daniel Rice, and culminated in the publication of The Ohio Breeding Bird Atlas in 1991. This book detailed the natural history of each bird species and displayed valuable maps of each species' breeding distribution in Ohio (see http://www.ohiobirds.org/obba2/pdf s/pdfselect.php for an electronic version of this volume). In 2006, Ohio joined the ranks of several other states by initiating its second breeding bird atlas, a project coordinated by The Ohio State University and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources-Division of Wildlife.

Simply put, a breeding bird atlas is a grid-based survey that documents the status and distribution of all bird species that breed within a given area. Ohio has been divided into 4,437 blocks, each equaling approximately 10 square miles. Approximately 20 of these atlas blocks encompass the area defined as the Lower Olentangy Watershed. Since most of Ohio's birds nest in the spring and summer, project volunteers will survey atlas blocks from late-April through August and compile a list of nesting bird species for

each block. This new information will be used to revise the current knowledge of Ohio's breeding birds and create new maps of each species' distribution.

Surveying the birds in each atlas block will require a substantial effort, and the success of Ohio's second breeding bird atlas will strongly depend on the dedicated efforts of hundreds of individuals who will form a statewide network of atlas participants and contributors. As a supporter of the preservation of the Lower Olentangy, you can play a key role in the new Ohio Breeding Bird Atlas II. The Ohio Breeding Bird Atlas II offers everyone an exciting way to learn about Ohio's rich natural heritage while encouraging participants to explore more of Ohio's beautiful landscapes. Anyone can participate, and submitting observations of breeding birds is easy. Even if you have only a casual interest in birds, we need your help!

The cooperation of private landowners is especially important in this project because nearly 95% of Ohio's lands are privately owned. If you own property within the watershed, now is the perfect time to

learn what birds are nesting on your property. At the same time, you'll have the opportunity to help the Ohio Breeding Bird Atlas II accomplish its goal of putting Ohio's breeding birds on the map! If you are interested in compiling a list of the breeding bird species that use your property and nearby areas, we would be more than happy to provide you with all the information needed to participate in this project. We can also arrange to have an atlas volunteer document breeding birds on your property or show you how it's done.

Columbus Public Schools Early Kindergarten Round-Up

April 1 through May 31, 2007

Now is the time to register district children who are expected to attend kindergarten next school year (2007-2008).

Requirements:

A child must be five years old by September 20 of the current school year. Kindergarten is mandatory, and every child must successfully complete kindergarten prior to first grade. For questions, contact the Department of Early Childhood Education at 614-365-5822.

What to bring:

- Birth Certificate
- Social Security Card
- Immunization Records
- Proof of Residence (i.e. A lease, gas or electric bill)

Many of our readers may already be aware of the drive underway to raise monies for a new sculptural fountain in Goodale Park. To keep the project on schedule, there is a need to gather more monies in a short timeframe. The Friends of Goodale Park and BrickStreet Art have been active in raising the nearly \$230,000 needed to realize the project. Construction could begin right after ComFest 2007, if the monies are realized.

In honor and memory of his partner, Paul Cianelli, Bruce Dooley and a host of their friends are attempting to raise \$75,000 of the needed monies to include a memorial to Paul at the pond's edge. Paul, an awardwinning project designer with Karlsberger and Design Group, Inc., helped sponsor a competition for a fountain sculpture in Goodale Park. He was an active part of the community, and part of his time was spent as: a Chairman of and an active member of the Friends of Goodale Park; he served as Chairman of Victorian Village Commission for many years; he was appointed to the Columbus Downtown Development Commission.

The fountain competition was won by Malcolm Cochran, an awardwinning artist and professor at OSU. The fountain, Tete-a-Tete Falls will become a centerpiece of Goodale Park, recalling in contemporary ways one which historically existed there.

Every Tuesday at Bar Louie's, from 4 p.m. to closing, their standard \$8.99 burgers are only \$1. Yes, ½ pound of hamburger, on a bun, with shredded lettuce. Yes, cheese is extra (50 cents), veggies, like tomato/mushroom/pickles are also 50 cents extra; artery cloggers, like guacamole, giardinera and bacon are another 50 cents; sauces, like mayo barbeque, etc, are a quarter extra. And, you can add fries or tots for \$1.99. Unless you are an absolute pig, for under \$4 you have a great burger.

The interior is very open and comfortable. Garage doors line most of the southern and eastern walls and lead out to a patio on both sides. Each time I have been there this Spring, with the doors open, it is like a great big picnic atmosphere. All the waitresses are young, young, and young ... and most pleasant and helpful.

Each day, from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m., there are a few drink and fingerfood specials. Their regular menu features sandwiches, burgers salads, desserts and small plates and large dinner offerings.

Parking might be a concern. In front of the eatery, parking is prohibited from 4 to 6. On the south side, the meters need to be plugged to 8 p.m.. However, by 6 the place is pretty packed ... so gather up a group of friends (all in one car) and try Bar Louie


Many of my neighbors are very artistic; I do not mean those I greatly envy who have a great sense of design and style and beautifully demonstrate this inside and outside their homes. I'm referring to the very talented neighbors who make their living using their greatly intuitive and highly developed creative talents. For years, I have seen Linda Fowler walking for exercise around the area. At some point in time, we must have spoken and I learned her name. Then, many years

back, I started noticing her name in the programs for art shows at various locations all around Columbus and beyond. She is frequently referenced in the monthly mailing from the Riffe Center, as in a recent one announcing the exhibit, GIVE and TAKE: Education and the Quiltmaker; she is conducting a Family Workshop -Kids Quilt! on May 6 — Linda is an Art Quilter.

Linda developed and honed an early interest in art and advanced to designing and creating commissioned quilt hangings which can be found in churches, libraries, chapels and health centers. She also spent years creating commissioned church vestments, altar cloths, and banners

for congregations around the Columbus region.

Her works can be found in the National 4H Conf Ctr inWashington, DC, the Merck Pharmaceutical Bldg in Philadelphia, Fidelity Investments Ctr in Cincinnati, OH, to name a few; Also, she has works in the Columbus collections of Price



Waterhouse, the Huntington Nat'l Bank, The Ohio State Univ, J.C. Penny Co, the Main Library, and Spagio Restaurant in Grandview + plus others.

Her life / career has been built on an early call to the church where she learned the ability to keep focus, slow down, and appreciate her natural environment. She joined the Sisters of St. Joseph and started teaching. With permission from her order, she earned a BFA and MFA degrees in the fiber department of OSU. Linda's education and life experiences have allowed her to transition from sewing to needlework and finally, to Quiltmaking.

Linda has "arrived" at this stage of her career in a most thorough fashion. After taking a weaving class at the Univ of Dayton, she enrolled at OSU as a weaving major; at OSU, she learned to develop film and create silk screens on paper. In the early 1980's, she attended the Craftsummer program at Miami Univ and studied batik and silk-screening on fabric. Her colorful palette and surrealistic uses of

shape and line create a sense of place with references to spirituality, architecture and cultural differences.

In 1988, Linda left the convent and later married. Today, she creates smaller, more intimate quilts, which are great for the individual home. She has been instrumental in creating the Quilt Surface Design International, LTD, which is holding its 18th Annual Symposium in Columbus (University Plaza Hotel at 3110 Olentangy River Rd) during the month of June. Classes will be taught for all levels of quilt artists by some of
