Parkland Dedication

river-front park

Thanks to the combined efforts of Society leadership, private development, and City government, Harrison West will soon have a new public park following the eastern banks of the Olentangy River, flowing south from Second Avenue towards downtown.

The recent sale of our Tax Increment Finance (TIF) bond package (\$3,080,000) allowed for the purchase of the Compton parcel (\$1,589,000) to be used for public park-land. The formerly blighted river-front property that was part of the old A.C. Humko factory was also transfered December 28th from private development to the City of Columbus, providing combined land for a 4.6 Acre public park. Plans for the new park consist of a Gazebo centered on First Avenue, an amphitheater, and recreation paths linking our parks and community with downtown, A partnership of community stake-holders will enable Harrison Park to become an integral and valuable

jewel in the Columbus Recreation & Park portfolio.

The Harrison West Society Park Committee will convene shortly to complete the final stages of park planning, under the guidance of Recreation & Parks Director Alan McKnight. Bravo to all for the many hours of hard work and dedication!

Bylaw vote in January

In Harrison West, most of us are making gradual changes to help out our Earth. Here is the city's list of ways you can make a difference. How many of these have you already adopted?

Change a light bulb If every American home replaced just one light bulb with a compact fluorescent, we would save enough energy to light more than 2.3 million homes for a year and prevent green house gases equivalent to the emissions of nearly 800,000 cars.

Find the Off Switch Leaving appliances in standby mode wastes significant amount of energy. Turn off computers, printers, stereos, televisions, DVD players, etc when not in use. Use a power strip/surge protector so you can completely power down.

Leave Your Car at Home If you bike, walk, or carpool just two days a week it will reduce green house gas emissions by an average of 1,590 pounds per year. Find a bus route at www.cota.com or van/car/bike pool options at MORPC. 1-888-742-RIDE.

Drive Smart Don't idle your engine unnecessarily and don't make jack rabbit starts. Make sure your car is properly maintained and the tires are properly inflated. Slow down--going 60 miles per hour instead of 70 saves 4 miles per gallon.

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle Reduce the amount of garbage you generate to looking for products that have less packaging. Buy recycled products. Reuse goods you don't need by donating them. Recycle everything you can.

Paper or Plastic? Neither! Take your own reusable bags to the grocery store and avoid having to choose between the lesser of these two evils.

Plant a Tree Trees absorb carbon dioxide.- as much as a ton over the lifetime of the tree. Trees also provide shade which can reduce heating bills.

Don't Wash Your Car in Your Drive-

way The soap goes into the street then into storm sewers and then into our waterways. Use a commercial car wash or a gravel or grass area that will keep the wash water contained.

Keep your House Not Too Hot, Not

Too Cold The energy used in an average home can be responsible for more than twice the greenhouse gas emissions of an average car and half of what an average family pays for heating and cooling. Adjust your thermostat 2 degrees year round and save as much as 20,000 pounds carbon dioxide emissions. Cut your utility bills by up to 40 percent by purchasing energy efficient home products that display the federal government's Energy Star label.

Safely Dispose of Household Hazardous Waste Many common chemicals you may have in your house such as pesticides, solvents, rat poison, antifreeze etc. can pose hazards to people, pets and the environment if they are not disposed of properly. Last month's Harrison West News told of SWACO's Permanent Household Hazardous Waste Drop Off Site newly opened on Wednesdays and Thursdays at the corner of East 8th Ave. and Essex Ave (1249 Essex, just a few blocks west of the 11th Ave. exit of I-71).


HARRISON WEST .40 TIF NUMBERS

We have the current number for the TIF as of January 3, 2008 listed below. The numbers are far better than originally projected. The rate is 6.25%, which is better than if the sale had not gone through before the first of the year.

Highlights include a source total of \$3,554,302 and \$977,137 for Park construction. Back payments for 2005 and 2006 should be made in March, 2008.

The properties consist of a single family brick home and two-family brick structure. Anyone interested in the re-zoning request should attend January's meeting.


